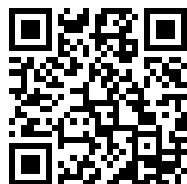
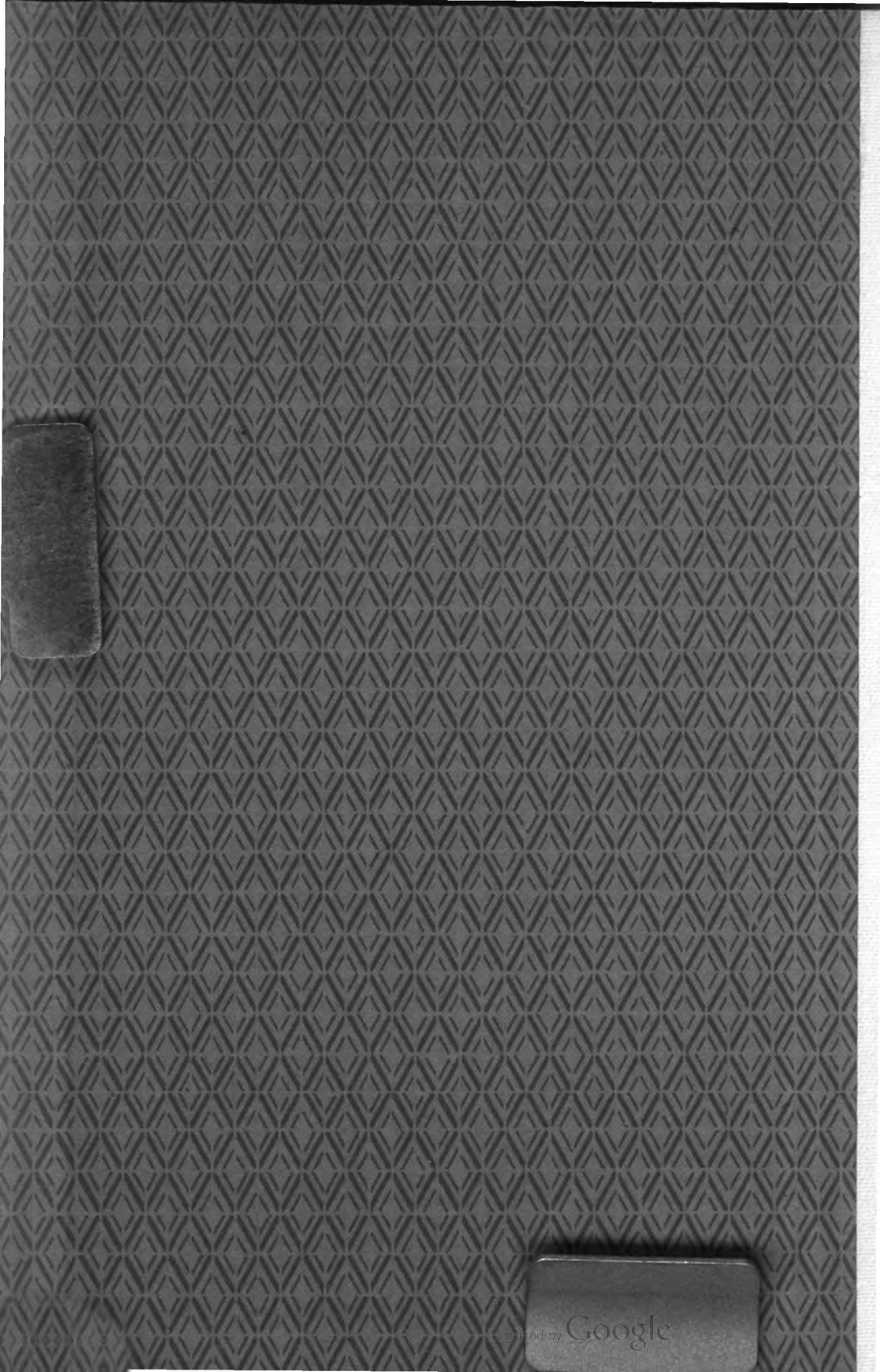

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GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH

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THE NEBRASKA GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY

The period has arrived in this great mid western state of Nebraska when an awakened and growing interest is felt in the pursuit of genealogical research; and when the practical importance, both to individuals and society, of the knowledge which is obtained by such research, begins to be appreciated.

To further genealogical investigation a society has been formed in Nebraska with head quarters in Lincoln known as the Nebraska Genealogical Society. The charter members include men and women well known in educational and patriotic work in Nebraska, among whom are: General George H. Hastings, Crete; Mayor Hans Warkow, Crete; Mrs. C. F. Spencer, State Regent, Daughters of the American Revolution, North Platte; Dr. David C. Hilton, Lincoln; Hon. Chas. H. Sloan, Geneva; Mrs. Victor F. Clark, Diller; Mrs. R. J. Kilpatrick, Beatrice; Dr. A. A. Ashby, Fairmont; Mrs. E. E. Correll, Hebron; Mrs. E. H. Wescott, Plattsmouth; Hon. George A. Williams, Fairmont; Miss Margaret E. Haughawout, Geneva; Mrs. J. J. Stubbs, Omaha.

The purpose of the society is to collect genealogical material and to make it available to all who desire to pursue the search for family history. This organization will be made the repository of perishable records of local history; vital statistics; manuscripts; etc. This material will be cared for in the fire proof vault of the Nebraska State Historical Society and will be available to all who wish to make use of it.

Dr. Henry Stiles, an old-time genealogist of long experience says "Genealogy is the science of personal identification. It has for its object the discovery and permanent establishment, by proofs and evidences which would be conclusive in any court of law, of the identity of the individual, both in his relations to those who have preceded him and to those who may succeed him in his own particular family line, as well as in his relations to those belonging to collateral lines of the general family of which he and they are members."

It is not until very recent years that complete records of births, deaths and marriages have been kept in any of our towns or states. What records we do find we should appreciate as having been kept voluntarily. Our ancestors were far too busy with other affairs of greater consequence to their own hard existence to give much time or attention to the keeping of records for the convenience of the future. They were struggling with the forces of nature to wrest a bare subsistence from the soil. In the New England states, New York, Pennsylvania, they were pushing new settlements west and north, bringing up large families of children in the wilderness. The land had first to be cleared of the forest and the corn planted

among the stumps or the prairie sod had to be broken and a sharp lookout kept at all times for Indians. Housed in log or sod houses in the far regions of the frontier country, beset on all sides by wild beasts and still more savage Indians, little time could be given to the keeping of records.

One of the great obstacles to successful genealogy is the difficulty of tracing families in their movements from town to town. This is something that never was of record and is not today. Our record system would be vastly improved by the enactment of a law requiring that before any person moved his residence from a town he should file with the county clerk a statement of his intention, stating his name, names of his family, place to which they are going and date of removal. The same law should require him to file similar information on his arrival with the county clerk of the town to which he goes.

The wonderful activity in genealogical research which has prevailed for the last fifteen years is due largely to the hereditary societies, composed of descendants of those who took part in some of the great events in American History, like the Revolution, The Colonial Wars; or have descent from the Mayflower passengers, or who settled in this country during its earliest years. Such societies were founded, nominally, for the making and preservation of historical and genealogical records and thereby to foster in the hearts of the present and future generations a respect for the flag and a love of country by holding up to them the heroic deeds and motives of their forefathers, and the sufferings and hardships they endured in establishing the government under which we now live.

These organizations have done an immense amount of good in patriotic education and Americanization. They deserve far more credit than the public seems willing to allow them. Many people are able to see in them little more than a manifestation of personal vanity, a desire to prove one's self a little better than his fellow man or woman. This element does certainly sometimes exist but only rarely and we should be able to see the great good the patriotic organizations have accomplished. Few can belong to the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution or similar societies without learning more of the history of the Revolution than they ever knew before.

It is no longer necessary to apologize for genealogy. Webster says "He that hath no regard for his ancestors does not deserve to be remembered by his posterity."

Membership in the Nebraska Genealogical Society is open to those who are interested in Genealogical and Historical research. It is in no sense a social club. The dues of the Society are \$2.00 a year. This includes a subscription to the magazine and two genealogical charts, one of which is to be filled out and returned to the Society for permanent record.

For those who are especially interested in this work and wish to contribute to its success a sustaining membership has been established at a cost of \$5.00 a year. Sustaining members are entitled to the magazine, the charts, and their names will be printed each quarter upon the front page of the magazine. Any data which they wish to have published will receive first consideration.

NANCE FAMILY

The following birth records are taken from a Bible now owned by Mrs. Walter L. Anderson, daughter of the late Albinus C. Nance, former governor of Nebraska. Mrs. Anderson recently came into possession of this Bible through the courtesy of Mrs. M. C. Stonecipher, wife of the minister of Hopewell church near Unadilla, Nebraska, who happened to mention to Mrs. Anderson that the Bible used in this church chronicles the births of a Nance family. It proved to be the family record of ancestors of Mr. Albinus C. Nance, and Hopewell Church voted to present the Bible to Mrs. Anderson in exchange for a very handsome book purchased by the latter. How the Nance family Bible came to be in the possession of Hopewell Church is a mystery. It is quite evident that the writer of the Nance family history, did not have access to this old Bible.

JINDRA CEMETERY

The Jindra Cemetery, laid out in 1873, was known as Maple Grove Cemetery. It is situated on the northwest quarter of the southeast quarter of section 2, township 7, north of range 4, east of the 6th P. M. in

Saline county, Nebraska, being approximately one and one-half miles south and east of Crete. The above forty acre tract was conveyed, November 26, 1873, by Wencel Jelinek and Annie Jelinek, his wife, to the directors of the said Maple Grove Cemetery, namely: G. W. Bridges, Charles Little, James Donnelly, J. R. Webster, and E. O. Wallace.

The Riverside Cemetery was platted September 13, 1879. The first addition to this cemetery was platted October 13, 1884; the second, August 30, 1887; the third, August 4, 1888, and the fourth, June 23, 1920.

Mr. Jesse C. Bickle laid out Riverside Cemetery in 1879, it being twenty acres in southeast corner of section 28, township 8, range 4. After Mr. Bickle had platted the cemetery he offered cemetery lots free of charge to those who had people buried in Maple Grove Cemetery, better known to the people of Crete as "Jindra Cemetery." Quite a number availed themselves of the opportunity and many bodies were removed to Riverside.

The Riverside Cemetery was managed by Mr. J. C. Bickle until his death in 1885, after which his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Ann Bickle, took charge until her death in 1900. She willed the cemetery to her brother, Mr. I. F. Hunt, who managed it until 1910. In 1910 Mr. Theo. Haden Sr. purchased the cemetery from Mr. Hunt and is in charge at the present time.

JAMES BLEAKLEY, a farmer and shoemaker, was the first to settle in the Buchanan Valley, Pa., about 1734. (History of Cumberland and Adams Counties p. 256). His name is on the tax list for 1799.

Isabella Bleakley was the first child born in the Valley, June 11, 1748; the first marriage was that of William Brandon and Jane Bleakley, 1778.

BROWN FAMILY OF PIPE CREEK, MD.

GEORGE BROWN, immigrant ancestor of this family, came from England and settled with other colonists from that country at Pipe Creek, Frederick Co., Md. He m. ———— Stevenson. The exact date of his death is unknown, but his will was proved in 1770.

In 1743 he was granted a tract of 350 acres of land called "Brown's Delight" in Westminster District near Pipe Creek, Md., but now in Carroll Co., near the town of Westminster.

They were the parents of 14 children, 8 sons and 6 daughters, nearly all of whom reared large families. Their son

NEBRASKA GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY CONSTITUTION
AS AMENDED OCTOBER 28, 1922.

ARTICLE I.

NAME.

The name of this organization shall be "*The Nebraska Genealogical Society.*"

ARTICLE II.

OBJECT.

The object of this Society shall be:

FIRST, To collect and to preserve all available genealogical material.

SECONDLY, To assist in preparing and completing family lines, to be filed for future reference.

THIRDLY, To gather by degrees a library, for the use of the Society, composed of all obtainable books, monographs, pamphlets, manuscripts, etc. relating to genealogy.

ARTICLE III.

MEMBERSHIP.

Any person may become a member by paying the annual dues.

ARTICLE IV.

OFFICERS.

Section 1. The officers of the Society shall consist of a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and a Librarian, whose duties shall be such as usually pertain to these offices, and such other duties as may be stated in the By-Laws.

Section 2. There shall be an Executive Board composed of the officers of the Society, and in addition, such other members as may be elected at the annual meeting of the Society, which transacts all business necessary to the interests of the Society including the filling of vacancies caused by the death or by the resignation of any officers of this Society, the accepting or rejecting of applications for membership and the appointing of the editorial staff of *The Nebraska and Midwest Genealogical Record*.

A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum of the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V.

COMMITTEES.

Section 1. There shall be three Standing Committees, as follows:

FIRST, Research Committee.

SECOND, Finance Committee.

THIRD, Membership Committee.

Sec. 2. The chairmen of these committees shall be elected each year at the annual meeting in January.

ARTICLE VI.

MEETINGS.

Section 1. The annual meeting shall be held on the fourth Friday in January, at which time the officers of the Society shall be elected by ballot and shall hold office for one year and until their successors are elected. The duties of these officers shall begin at the close of the January meeting.

Sec. 2. The regular meetings of the Society shall be held on the fourth Friday in January, in April, in July and in October.

A majority of the members present at any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VII.

This constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Society by a two-thirds vote of the members present, notice of proposed amendment having been given at a previous regular meeting.

By-Laws.

I. The annual dues shall be \$2 payable in advance on or before the fourth Friday in January of each year. The first annual dues of members joining the Society between July first and the fourth Friday in January shall be \$1.

II. Any member being delinquent for one year shall be dropped from the roll.

III. The Executive Board shall meet at such times and places as may be designated by the President, or at the call of at least three members of the Executive Board.

IV. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Society and of the Executive Board and shall present to the Society any

plans for extending or for improving the work of the Society. She shall sign all warrants authorizing the payment of the Society funds. In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall preside or if the Vice-President be not present, any member of the Executive Board may be chosen to act *pro tempore*.

V. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep an accurate record of all the proceedings of the Society, to sign all warrants authorizing the payment of the Society funds, to keep a list of members and their addresses, to notify members when dues are payable and at the annual meeting to report the number of members in good standing.

VI. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to collect all dues, fees and other moneys belonging to the Society, to pay out money upon a warrant signed by the President and the Secretary, to keep an account of receipts and disbursements, to report at each meeting of the Society all money received and expended by her and to give a complete report at the annual meeting.

VII. The Librarian shall have charge of all papers, records and books belonging to the Society, the same to be available to the members of the Society under such regulations as may be adopted by the Executive Board.

VIII. The Research Committee shall encourage genealogical work and shall urge the filling out of lineal charts.

IX. The Finance Committee shall have charge of all plans for securing financial support, aside from the membership dues.

X. The Membership Committee shall endeavor to arouse public interest in the objects of the Society and thus increase the membership.

XI. The Executive Board shall appoint an editorial staff for *The Nebraska and Midwest Genealogical Record*, consisting of nine members, one of whom shall be the Managing Editor. These nine members shall be divided into three classes of three members each, so that this number (three) may be appointed annually to serve for three years. The Managing Editor shall be a member of the Executive Board.

XII. These By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the Society by a two-thirds vote of the members present, notice of proposed amendment having been given at a previous regular meeting.

ROE CEMETERY

The plot for the first cemetery near Fairmont, Nebr., was donated by Poly Roe, about 1872. It is located on the northwest quarter of section 6, three and one-half miles north of Fairmont.

The earliest burials were here; later the bodies were removed to the Fairmont Cemetery; eight or nine graves remain, only two being marked with shattered stones.

Turner Cemetery is located two and three-fourths miles south of Penokee, Kansas. In the early seventies the graves in a cemetery known as Mile Brook Cemetery were removed to a piece of ground given for that purpose by a Mr. Turner, and the place was known as Turner's Cemetery. RAY FAMILY.

The Ray family is of Scotch Irish origin. There were two distinct clans, the heads of which were brothers. They were called Castle Rays and Winnette Court Rays, receiving the names from their places of residence. There has been a John Ray in every family, one of whom being noted for his brilliant mind and powers of oratory was councillor to Queen Victoria.

WILLIAM RAY who belonged to the Winnette Court Ray branch of the family was born November 4, 1740 in Belfast, Down County, Ireland. He remained there until grown, when an insurrection broke out. He enlisted with the rebels in their fight for liberty. The rebels were overpowered and he had to flee from his country. He and one sister embarked for America in 1772. He settled in Chester County, Pa.; enlisted in the Revolutionary War; served as first lieutenant under Capt. Anthony Wayne and later under Mordecai Chaffin; engaged in the battles of White Plains, Brandywine, Germantown, Monmouth and Stony Point. His pension was granted May 8, 1834, but was not paid until June 28, 1840. After the war, he married Anna Brown (b. 1756 in Maryland, d. Apr. 15, 1829, aged 69 yrs.) and settled in Jefferson County, Ky. In 1810, he moved to Vigo Township, Butler County, Ohio. In 1818 he went with his son, William, to Vigo County, Ind. He died July 29, 1840, and was buried in Riley Township, Vigo County, Ind., seven miles southeast of Terre Haute in the Harkness family burying ground. It is now a pasture lot, but the family have had a wire fence erected to enclose the graves, and the Terre Haute Sons of the American Revolution put up a marker. The old head stone has fallen but lies by the grave and on it could be traced the words: "Here lies honest dust. William Ray b. Nov. 4, 1740, d. July 29, 1840. Rev. Soldier." PATRIOTIC SOCIETIES.

ELIGIBILITY TO MEMBERSHIP.

Huguenot Society of America. Those eligible to membership in this society are:

FIRST, Descendants in the male or female line of the Huguenot families who emigrated to America prior to the Promulgation of the Edict of Toleration, November 28th, 1787, or who left France for other countries than America prior to that date.

SECONDLY, Persons who have made the history, genealogy, principles, etc., of the Huguenots a special study and research, and have written and published the same.

Daughters of Founders and Patriots of America. Eligibility for membership is founded upon descent from patriotic ancestry in unbroken line through the Colonial times and the Revolutionary War. She must be descended in the *direct paternal* line of either father or mother from an ancestor who settled in any of the Colonies now included in the United States of America from the settlement of Jamestown, Va., May 13, 1607 to May 13, 1687 and provided the intermediate ancestor in said direct line at the call of the Colonists adhered as a patriot to their cause in the Revolutionary War which ended with the Independence of the Colonies.

Colonial Dames. Women are eligible who are descended in their own right from some ancestor of worthy life who came to reside in an American Colony prior to 1750, which ancestor or some one of his descendants, being a lineal ascendant of the applicant shall have rendered efficient service to his country during the Colonial Period, either in the founding of a commonwealth or of an institution which has survived and developed into importance, or who shall have held an important position in a Colonial govern-

ment, or who by distinguished services shall have contributed to the founding of this great and powerful nation.

All services which constitute a claim for membership must have been rendered before July 5, 1776, but this date shall be held to include all the signers of the Declaration of Independence.

Daughters of the American Revolution. Any woman not less than eighteen years of age who is descended from a man or woman who gave unflinching loyalty to the cause of American Independence as a recognized patriot, soldier, sailor or civil officer, in one of the several Colonies or States, is eligible to membership in the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution;—provided that she be personally acceptable.

The Hereditary Order of the Descendants of Colonial Governors. Any person who is descended from a man who served as governor of one of the original thirteen colonies prior to its admission to the Union.

Society of Holland Dames. Any woman is qualified for membership in this society who is above the age of eighteen years lineally descended from a Hollander (Nederlander) resident of New Netherlands previous to the treaty of Westminster, 1674 and who has been adjudged worthy and acceptable to the society. The admitting member must have been a man born in the Netherlands, of Holland parentage and must have been either:

- (a) A Director General of New Netherlands.
- (b) A member of the Council of the Director General of New Netherlands.
- (c) A member of a Representative body, religious or secular of New Netherlands.
- (d) A Patroon or Freeholder of New Netherlands.
- (e) A Commissioner in New Netherlands either of boundaries, treaties or Indian affairs.
- (f) A commissioned officer, a soldier, or a sailor who served in defense of the Colonies.

Society of Mayflower Descendants. Every lineal descendant, over eighteen years of age, of any passenger of the "Mayflower" which terminated at Plymouth, Massachusetts, December 1620, including all signers of "The Compact," shall be eligible to membership.

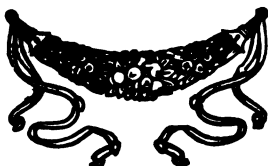

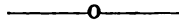

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ORR FAMILY

WILLIAM ORR was born in Scotland, married about 1762 in Ireland, emigrated to eastern Pennsylvania, later to Rostraver Township, Westmoreland County, Pa., and received a grant of land there in 1778. William Orr and his family were Covenanters of the United Presbyterian faith. The congregation to which they belonged was one of a group of churches which formed the famous Redstone Presbytery organized in 1781. He died in Elizabeth Township, Allegheny County, Pa., in 1814. PECKHAM FAMILY

The following line was worked out for a client by the Family Records Bureau for the purpose of proving her eligibility to membership in the Society of Daughters of Founders and Patriots of America. This line traces back to the Archbishop of Canterbury.

JOHN PECKHAM was born in England and baptized Apr. 8, 1595.

In 1634 he was chaplain to the Earl of Hertford and there is no doubt but that as chaplain to that nobleman he made the acquaintance of Sir Henry Vane, the younger. There can be little doubt that the extreme theological views of Sir Henry Vane became the convincing argument that turned John Peck-

ham from his allegiance to the Church of England. These more or less extreme views may be described in the language of that day as those of a Baptist Lollard. John Peckham was in Rhode Island in 1638. He is supposed to have come to Boston in 1634 with Sir Henry Vane. In Boston, he met Mary Clarke, who had accompanied her brother, Dr. John Clarke, to Boston. While John Peckham's name does not appear in the list of those disarmed in Boston, nor among the followers of Wheelwright, nor one of the signers of the Portsmouth Covenant, yet he must have been one of the party known as the Ann Hutchinson Party, who founded a settlement on the north end of Rhode Island, the town of Portsmouth. On March 16, 1641, he was admitted a freeman. In 1641 he was one of the ten male members of the First Baptist Church of Newport in full communion. He had five children by his first wife, Mary Clarke. After her death he married, Eleanor (probably born Peckham) by whom he had seven children. John Peckham died in 1681 and Mary Clarke in 1648.

JOHN PECKHAM (*John*) b. abt. 1644, at Newport, Rhode Island, m. 1667 Sarah Newport. He lived on the Peckham estate at Little Compton, R. I. and was one of the original proprietors of East Greenwich, R. I., although there is no evidence that he resided there. He had eleven children.

ISAAC PECKHAM (*John, John*) b. Apr. 11, 1688, d. Feby. 10, 1765, m. 1st Nov. 8, 1711, Barabra Philips, dau. John and Rebecca Philips. She was born March 15, 1687, died 1726. He m. 2nd, Jane Sisson, dau. of Richard and Ann (Card) Sisson. She was born July 5, 1706, d. Sept. 25, 1778 at Lanesboro, Mass. where she had gone from Kingston, R. I. to visit her daughter, Ann Peckham Barker, at whose house she died. Isaac Peckham was made a freeman at Newport, R. I., in 1714. From there he moved to Middletown, R. I., where he was a freeman in 1757. His will was dated May 14, 1763, proved Feby. 22, 1765. By his first wife, he had eight children. By his second wife, he had ten more children.

PHILIP PECKHAM (*Isaac, John, John*) b. July 11, 1725, d. Apr. 18, 1819, buried in the Rural Cemetery at Lancaster, Erie County, N. Y. He married 1st July 28, 1753 Jane Nye of Dartmouth, now New Bedford, Mass. She was born Dec. 26,

1730 and was the dau. of Thomas and Deborah (Peckham) Nye. After her death he married 2nd her twin sister, Patience Nye. Philip Peckham was Lieutenant of the Train Band in 1776 for which service his grave is annually decorated by the Daughters of the American Revolution. It is not known where his two wives are buried. After the Revolution he moved from Middletown to Munson, Mass., from thence to Randolph, Vt. 1790, and thence to Lancaster, Erie County N. Y. where he died.

PARDON PECKHAM (*Phillip, Isaac, John, John*) b. Aug. 12, 1673, in Middletown, R. I., d. Oct. 15, 1851, m. Olive Blodgett b. 1761, d. Feby. 19, 1846 About the time of the breaking out of the Revolution he removed from Rhode Island to Munson, Mass. from which place he enlisted at the age of seventeen as a private in Capt. John Carpenter's Company of Guards at Springfield, Mass., serving from June 12, 1780 to Feby. 13, 1781. After the Revolution he went to live at Randolph, Vt. He next moved to Bloomfield Vt., and finally to Lancaster, Erie County, N. Y., where he died and was buried. His wife was also buried there. Pardon Peckham and Olive Blodgett had eight children.

THOMAS NYE PECKHAM (*Pardon, Phillip, Isaac, John, John*) b. Mch. 20, 1802 at Randolph, Vt., d. May 10, 1883 at Lancaster, N. Y., m. 1st Dec. 28, 1837 at Lancaster, N. Y. Emeline Bagley, dau. of Edward Bagley of North Providence, R. I. She was born at Randolph, Vt. and died Sept. 5, 1851. He married 2nd Sophronia (Atwood) Townsend who also predeceased him. June 30th 1683 John Gilbert was born about one of the clock afternoon being Saturday.

January 22nd 1683, My Grandfather Gilbert died about 3 of the clock in the morning being aged about 83.

September 8th 1684, Jonathan Gilbert was born about half an hour before sunrise on Sabbath Morne and died September 27th 1684 at 7 o'clock in the afternoon being Saturday.

25. JOHN GREENE, (*Richard*) Surgeon. The progenitor of the Warrick Greenes, was the son of Richard and Mary (Hooker) Greene. Born at Bowridge Hill. Parish of Gillingham, County Dorset, England, where his ancestors had resided for nearly one hundred years. Mary Hooker, daughter of John Hooker was born at Exeter, Eng., 1524. John Hooker's father, Robert had been mayor of the city in 1520. John Hooker was the first chamberlain of the city in 1555. and in 1526 a member of Irish Parliament, 1571, member English Parliament from Exeter, died 1601, age 80 years. Buried Exeter Cathedral. Author of "State of Ireland and Order of keeping Parliament in That County," being in the British Museum, under title, "Order and Usage of keeping Parliament in England." John Hooker was uncle of Richard Hooker, a celebrated Divine. John Greene removed early to Samen (Salsbury) County, town of Wiltshire, and was married there at St. Thomas' Church, November 4, 1619 to Joanne Tattershall. The first of her family came to England with William, The Conqueror.

John Greene was styled "Mr." and "Gentleman" and practiced surgery sixteen years. On April 6, 1635, he registered for embarkation at Hampton, England, with his wife and six children, in the ship James of two hundred tons, Willam Cooper, Master. Voyage fifty-eight days. Arrived at Boston, June 3rd, 1635. Settled at Salem where he formed a friendship with Roger Williams, building a house there. Joined Rogers Williams at Providence, Rhode Island, a month after his flight. Home lot number 15 on Main street. One of eleven baptized by Roger Williams and one of the twelve founders of the First Baptist Church on this continent, organized at Providence, R. I. First professional and for many years, the only medical man in Providence plantation. First wife Joanne died soon after going to Rhode Island. Supposed to be buried at Connimicut, Old Warwick. Removed to Warwick, 1642-3. John Green was a prominent man in the public affairs of the town and colony, and enjoyed the confidence and respect of his associates through long and active political life, holding office almost continuously until summer before he died, when he refused to accept office of commissioner, though repeatedly urged thereto. Died and buried at Connimicut, Old Warwick, beside his first wife, in the first week of January, 1659. August 1, 1637, "Mr. John Greene of New Province, bound to quarterly court, first Tuesday of seventh month next, for speaking contemptuously of magistrates in one hundred marks." Massachusetts Colony Record, Vol. I, Page 200. Fined twenty pound and forbidden jurisdiction on pain of fine and imprisonment for speaking contemptuously of magistrates, Sept. 19, 1637, Massachusetts Colony Record, Vol. I, Page 203. A letter was sent to the court, dated New Providence, wherein the court was charged with usurping the power of Christ over the churches, and men's consciences and it was then ordered March 12, 1638, that he "should not come within their jurisdiction, etc." In all transaction in Warwick, John Greene was a prominent figure. Will dated Dec. 28, 1658, and proved January 7th, 1659. Left his large estates to his

descendants and much of it continues in the hands of his posterity.

26. JAMES GREEN, (*John, Richard*)— Baptized June 21, 1626. Married first, Deliverance Potter, second Elizabeth Anthony. Made Freeman of Warwick and Providence plantations in 1647. Was on "Roule of Ye Freeman of Ye Colonie of Everie Town," in 1655 and was Town Clerk, May 16, 1661. Was member of the General Assembly of the colony, being commissioner under the first charter, and deputy and assistant under the second, 1663. For ten years, between 1660 and 1675, considered "a man of much practical sagacity." During Indian war, 1675 and 1676, his house was burned to the ground. In 1684, having purchased Warwick land, removed to Potowomut, where was an ancient mill and built his house on the hill, near the west bank of the river, overlooking the beautiful lake which furnished the water power for the forge, which his grandsons, sons of Jabez Greene, established for making anchors, and other forms of iron work. This residing place was the birth place of his great grandson, Major General Nathaniel Greene of the Revolutionary Army, and residence of his descendants for over two hundred years. Died April 27, 1698. Buried in the old Warwick burial ground. Inscription on the altar tomb still well preserved. Memorial stone erected by Rufus W. Greene and Benjamin Greene Arnold, contains records of Greene family.
27. JOHN GREENE, (*James, John, Richard*) Born September 30, 1685, died Dec. 8th, 1757, son of James and Elizabeth Anthony. Married Mary Allen, daughter of Increase Allen of Dartmouth, Mass. Born May 29, 1689. John Greene was born at Potowomut. Freeman April, 1708. Will dated June 22nd, 1754, proved Dec. 11, 1757. Was married Feb. 16, 1709-10.
28. JOSEPH GREEN (*John, James, John, Richard*) Born Feb. 19, 1727. Married Phoebe Langford. John Green born at Warwick. Was a tailor and a Quaker, and wore costume of that sect. 1769 removed from Warwick or East Greenwich, to Berlin, Renssalaer County, N. Y., and was third white settler

of the town. In old ledger of a shipping firm of Providence, R. I., 1775-78 was found records of transactions with George Washington, Nathaniel Greene, General Sullivan and Jacob Greene and sons. In this last transaction, was an entry of the sale of "the house and lot in East Greenwich, which we, (the shipping merchants) bought of Joseph Greene", but a few years after his removal to New York. John Greene was a great friend of General Van Rensselaer, and always stopped at his house when in Albany. Married first, Oct. 27, 1751, Phoebe, daughter of John and Barbara (Rice) Langford of East Greenwich, R. I. Born April 26, 1734. Old Langford place about three miles from East Greenwich, was distinguished by an enormous elm tree of great age and beauty. He died at Berlin, Rensselaer Co., N. Y., in 1824, age 96. Their son Alfred Lewis Sprague, baptized Alfred Jackson Sprague, was born in Mount Vernon, Knox County, Ohio, March 6, 1828, died at Buffalo Gap, Custer County, S. D., Oct. 1906. He lived at Plattsmouth, Nebr., where he was elected to the Assembly that framed the constitution of Nebraska, also assisted in laying out the city of Lincoln. He moved to the Black Hills in 1877, finally settling near Buffalo Gap in 1884. He was elected to the last Territorial Legislature in the Dakota Territory, thus helping to frame the Constitution of the new State of South Dakota. He married 2nd Laura Sophronia McMaken who was born at Fort Wayne, Ind., Sept. 4, 1836. She was the daughter of Colonel Joseph Hamilton McMaken, born in Boone County, Ky., April 21, 1789, from whence he removed to Butler County, Ohio, in May 1832. He later moved to Middletown, Des Moines County, Iowa, where he died Sept. 21, 1858. Colonel Joseph Hamilton McMaken married Catherine Bacon, who was born at Olean, Catteraugus County, N. Y., May 11, 1800. She died at Plattsmouth, Nebr., in 1880. Ancestry is desired to the immigrant ancestor of all the above named. The great-grandfather and grandfather of Laura Sophronia McMaken served with the Pennsylvania troops in the Revolutionary War, the latter being a sergeant. JUDGE ALFRED M. POST

Judge Alfred M. Post, judge of the sixth judicial district and former justice of the Nebraska Supreme Court, died Sunday morning, August 26, 1923, at his home in Columbus, Nebraska. By his death the Nebraska Genealogical Society loses a member that it can ill afford to lose. Judge Post was deeply interested in all civic affairs and in all organizations that were doing a work worth while and cheerfully gave his support.

He was born in Greenfield, Pa., of an old colonial family, August 10, 1847. He graduated from the University of Ohio in 1868. He taught school in Iowa for a brief period and then entered upon the practice of law at Leon, Iowa, in 1870. In 1874, he was appointed by President Grant as United States Consul at Santiago, Cape de Verde Islands, where he served for two years. Upon his return to America he established his law practice at Columbus, Nebraska. In 1883, he was appointed Judge of the district court in the fourth district and held that position until the fall of 1891, when he was elected to the state supreme bench. He was justice of the supreme court until January, 1898 and was then appointed one of the United States district attorneys for Alaska by President McKinley. He resigned after spending one year in Alaska and returned to his practice in Columbus. From 1911 to 1913, he was chairman of the commission appointed to revise and codify the statutes of Nebraska. In January 1921, he was again appointed judge of the sixth district, without solicitation on his part. At the time of his death, Judge Post was dean of the Platte County bar.

REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS BURIED IN IOWA

The bodies of five soldiers of the Revolutionary War are buried in Iowa. All of them migrated to the territory of Iowa as old men and the youngest of them was eighty years of age when he died. The two oldest were ninety.

In "Somerset Visitations" by Philmore & Company, vol. 1, p. 116, it says Robert Royce of Martock, Somerset, married June 4, 1624, Mary Sims of Long Sutton, Somerset. He is said to have come in the ship Francis from Ipswich. He was first found at Stratford, Ct. In 1644, he was at New London, Ct. He died 1676 and his widow was living on his estate in 1688. WILLIAM WRIGHT, perhaps the William who was baptized at Austerfield, England, 1588, came in the "Fortune," 1621, with wife *Priscilla*, daughter of Alexander Carpenter, and perhaps son Richard. Had lands assigned 1623, freeman 1633. Samuel Fuller in his will calls him "Brother." He made a will Sept. 16, 1633.

RICHARD¹ WRIGHT, Plymouth, perhaps son of the first William; proprietor 1636; able to bear arms 1643; freeman June 5, 1644. He married 6 Nov. 1644 Hester² Cooke (Francis,¹ Mayflower), and had:

2. Esther Wright b. 1649
3. Mary Wright
4. John Wright
5. Isaac Wright b. and d. 1652.

His son John went into military service leaving a will probated 7 June 1676; his other sons Adam and Isaac and daughter Esther and the father were legatees. Richard died 1681, aged about 83 years; his wife Hester died between Dec. 28, 1668, and Jan. 3, 1669 (May. Des. 4-128.)

ADAM² WRIGHT (*Richard*¹) lived in that part of Plymouth which afterward became Plympton. He married (1) *Sarah*,³ daughter of John² Soule (*George*,¹ Mayflower); married (2) *Mehitable Barrows*. The date of *Sarah Soule's* marriage to *Adam Wright*, the date of her death, and the date of his marriage to

Mehitable Barrows are unknown. *Sarah* was living 16 March 1690-1 when she signed the deed printed herewith; but she probably died before 1699, since Mehitable's son Samuel who died 5 Jan. 1773 in his 74th year must have been born about 1699. *Adam Wright* died 20 Dec. 1724 in his 80th year [May. Henry Bartholmew, Salem, Nov. 7, 1635, born about 1607, died at Salem Nov. 22, 1692. Married Elizabeth Scudder of Salem, who died Sept. 1, 1682, aged about 60 years. Their son Henry, baptized 1657, in will mentions "sister (Abigail) Dudson, alias Lawthrop", also "brother Col. Elisha Hutchinson." Reference: Essex Antiquarian, vol. 7, page 45.

SECOND LINE

John Scudder, Barnstable 1640, bore arms 1643, had a sister Elizabeth, discharged from Boston church Nov. 10, 1644, with recommendations, and married 28 of same month Samuel Lathrop, son of Rev. John, at his father's home in New London. Ref: Savage's Gen. Dict. of N. E. vol. 4, page 43. It has been asserted that the Elizabeth who married Samuel Lathrop was the widow of Henry Bartholmew, but the references given show that this was impossible. David Carwithy, Southhold. "Mr. Carwithy being visited with sickness, desires to set things in order, being weak in body but perfect in memory." Leaves to son Caleb "My best suit of clothes and a bed blanket." To daughter Martha a scythe and a Bible. To daughter Elizabeth Crowner* (Crammer) 9 pounds sterling. "As for my son David, I left him his portion when I

came from him." Makes daughter Sarah Curtis sole executrix. Dated August 30, 1665. Witnesses, John Conckling, sr., Simon Grover, Jacob Conckling. Proved Nov., 1665. Sarah Curtis of Hashamomack, near Southhold, L. I., is confirmed as executrix and Quietus granted Oct. 5, 1666, by Gov. Nicoll. Note: This name after many changes is now Corwith, and the family are numerous on Long Island. (N. Y. Historical Collections, 1892, Abstracts of Wills, vol. 1, page 344.) David Carwithy was at Salem 1644. Wife's name Grace. (Savage's Gen. Dict. vol. 1, page 344.) David Carwith is chosen Constable of Marblehead for the year ensuing, Jan. 25, 1644, at Salem. (Essex Institute, vol. 9, page 127). At a general town meeting, April 20, 1658, he was chosen on a jury at Salem. (Essex Institute, vol. 9, page 216.) Mary, his daughter, married Wm. Chichester. (Essex Institute, vol. 14, page 252.) She was received into church at Salem, Dec. 23, 1657. (Essex Institute, vol. 15, page 81.) David Carwithy and daughter Sarah Curtis then removed to Southhold 1665. (Essex Institute, vol. 15, page 77.)

*Note. In the Crammer line given in New Jersey Genealogies, Elizabeth daughter of David Carwithy is said to have married John Crammer who lived in Long Island about 1660, but removed to New Jersey soon after and whose descendants now live near Trenton, N. J. (vol. 1, page 133). In Pope's History of Taunton it is said that David Carwithy was proposed as freeman there in 1639, but "as nothing more is heard of him, he probably died soon after" (page 36).

MRS. GERTRUDE IRENE GEAR STUBBS

The passing away on March 22, 1924, of Mrs. Gertrude Irene Gear Stubbs was a sorrow to a wide circle of friends in church and patriotic work.

She was a devoted church communicant being the daughter of Ezekiel G. Gear, known as "Father Gear", the once famous pioneer chaplain of Ft. Snelling. He was the first Episcopal minister to hold service in Minnesota, about 1830.

ANN ASH, dau. of Joshua Ash and Abigail, his wife, was born Sept. 17th, 1772, half after two in the afternoon.

JOSHUA ASH, son of Joshua Ash, Jr., was born Jan. 8th, 1774, half a hour before one in the morning.

ANNA EVANS ASH, dau. of Joshua Ash, Jr., and Abigail, his wife, was born July 23rd, 1776, eleven o'clock in the morning.

SAMUEL EVANS ASH, son of Joshua Ash, Jr., and Abigail, his wife, was born Apr. 16th, 1779, at fifteen minutes after 2 o'clock in the morning.

CHARLES ASH, son of Joshua Ash, Jr., and Abigail, his wife, was born Apr. 8th, 1781, about five o'clock in the morning.

JOSHUA ASH departed this life the 22nd of the 8th month, 1784, and interred in Friend burial ground the 23rd, 1784.

CALEB ASH, brother of Joshua Ash, departed this life Aug. 24, 1797, at half past eleven o'clock and was the 25th Aug. 1797 interred the same.

THE ANCESTRY OF ONE BRANCH OF THE CALHOUN FAMILY IN THE UNITED STATES

This record, heretofore unpublished, was taken from family records and notes gathered and carefully compiled by the late Mrs. Harriet Malvina Allison of Beatrice, Nebraska, which are in the possession of her daughter, Miss Mabel Allison of Ontario, California. These records have been arranged for publication, for the first time, by Mrs. Robert J. Kilpatrick of Beatrice, Nebraska, with the permission of Miss Allison.

The Calhouns of Scotland are descended from the ancient family of the Colquhouns and the Lairds of Luss. The original

name of Colquhoun is still retained by many in Scotland, England and Ireland, but pronounced Calhoun. Buchanan says in his "Inquiry into the Ancient Genealogy of Ancient Scottish Sir Names" that the ancestor of the surname of Colquhoun was Humphrey Kilpatrick, in whose favor the Earl of Lennox obtained a charter of the land of Colquhoun in the reign of Alexander II, about 1200.

The first who assumed the name Colquhoun was Ingraham, or Ingram, the successor of the above-named Kilpatrick.

Humphrey Colquhoun, three or four generations after, married a daughter of Godfrey, Laird of Luss, 1394.

The Colquhouns and Lairds of Luss were among the most illustrious clans of Scotland. The names of Colhoun, Calhoun and Cahoon have the same origin. The first of the name to emigrate to America, were three brothers, David, James and John. They landed in New York, 1714, and then separated; James went to Maryland, John settled in South Carolina, and David settled in New York, and from thence removed to Stratford, Fairfield Co., Connecticut.

David was born in Scotland, not far from the year 1670: the family were rigid Protestants, and he, with his father's family (Non-Conformists) emigrated to Ireland to escape persecution, and settled not far from Londonderry. These persecutions followed them to Ireland, and at length induced three of the family to come to America.

While residing in Stratford, David married Mrs. Catharine Fairchild, whose maiden name was Coe. By her he had six sons and two daughters. In 1732, he removed to Woodbury, N. W. Purchase, afterwards Indea, and now Washington, Conn.; then having purchased a large tract of land, he resided there until his death, in 1769.

The sons of David were: Joseph, David, James, John, Ebenezer and George. They all married and settled in Washington, within the limits of a school district, which gave it the name of Calhoun District.

James, the second brother, settled in Maryland: one of his sons was at one time mayor of Baltimore. Two of the sons of

John, the third brother, were members of Congress, one of them being a member of the U. S. Senate when he died.

Joseph, the eldest son of David, lived to the age of 80 years, and died about the year 1810, at Woodbury, Conn.

The immigrant ancestor of this branch of the Calhoun family, Andrew Calhoun, was born in Rye, near Londonderry, Ireland, March 27, 1764. He came to America in 1790, settling first in Boston, and then removing to Rindge, N. H., and subsequently to the Valley of the Mohawk.

After the death of his wife, in 1830, he returned again to Boston, and from thence to Concord, N. H., where he lived a number of years. He died April 14, 1842, aged 78 years. He had seven sons and two daughters, all of whom are living (January, 1855). Two sons and one daughter remained in Massachusetts, the rest reside in New York, Ohio, Illinois and Syria, Asia.

His great-grandfather, whose name was William (as was his father's), went from Scotland to Ireland to enjoy religious peace; that he was a brother of David, James and John is not unlikely, also to the progenitor of the Kentucky Calhouns, as they must be nearly allied.

The Kentucky Calhouns are nearly connected with the Massachusetts family, they arrived in this country about the period of the Revolution.

John Calhoun (my grandfather) was a physician, much respected, and of extensive practice; he was born in 1738, and died in Washington, Connecticut, July 8, 1788, in the fiftieth year of his age.

CALKIN FAMILY RECORDS

HUGH¹ CALKIN b. 1600, at Chepstow, Monmouthshire, Wales, d. 1690 at Norwich, Ct., m. Ann ———. He emigrated to this country in 1638 with his wife and son John who was four years

of age. He settled first at Green's Harbor (now Marshfield), Mass. He later removed to Gloucester with the Rev. Richard Blinman and others, and became one of the Board of Selectman. In 1650 he was chosen Deputy to the General Court of Massachusetts Colony. He seems not to have remained long at Gloucester, as the Connecticut Colony Records, vol. 1, p. 230, record him as Deputy from New London. By order of the General Court, Oct. 3, 1654, Hugh and another man were appointed a committee for enlisting men to fight the Narragansett Indians. (vol. 1, p. 264). These records also state that he was a Deputy Magistrate. Hugh and his son John were among the original thirty-five proprietors of Norwich, Ct. The records show that Hugh served as Deputy from Norwich to the General Court ten times. He was a deacon of the first church built in Norwich. Children of Hugh Calkin and Ann were:

She died July 3, 1837, and is buried beside her husband in Hilton cemetery, Bradford county, Pa. Moses Calkin spent his early life at Duanesburg, N. Y. He enlisted when a mere boy in the Revolutionary War, serving twelve months as a private and teamster. After his marriage, he removed to Sugar Creek, Bradford county, Pa., locating on a farm one-half mile west of the present West Bur-

lington, Pa. He applied for a pension Dec. 11, 1832. His claim was allowed. Children of Moses Calkin and Thankful Stevens were:

2. JOEL b. 1785, d. Aug. 18, 1867, in West Burlington, Bradford county, Pa., m. Laura, daughter of Ezekial Leonard of Springfield, Pa. To them were born eight children.

5. Moses, m. Eveline Braffitt. They had four sons and one daughter. They moved to Ohio where he died, the last survivor of the sons.
6. Oliver m. Julia, daughter of Truman Merry. They had one son and two daughters. He occupies the homestead.
7. Lucy m. Benjamin McKean, sheriff of Towanda, Pa. They had two sons and one daughter. Lucy d. Sept. 4, 1828, in Towanda, Pa., aged 35 yrs.
8. Abby m. Lyman Leonard of Springfield, Pa., and with him embraced the Mormon faith, following with that sect to Nauvoo, Ill., and then to Salt Lake City, Utah. Their one son was killed by the Indians on their exodus to Salt Lake. Their one daughter, Mary Jane Leonard, was twice married. Her first husband was ——— Thurston. Her second husband was ——— Hill. Mr. Hill was a Mormon elder. She resided in Salt Lake City, had no children, but an adopted son, Abel Leonard.
9. Thankful (Sophy) married Myron Ballard, reared a large family and died in Columbia, Pa.
10. Amanda married Orrin P. Ballard of Troy, Pa. They had one son.

ROSEDALE CEMETERY, PHOENIX, ARIZONA

This cemetery lies in the southwest part of Phoenix, near 20 Ave. and Washington street. It was platted 1898, deed acknowledged January 21, 1898, and recorded April 30, of the same year. There have been no burials there since 1911 or 1912, and the grounds are unfenced, untended and in general disrepair. Many of the board markers are so worn by the weather that the inscriptions can scarcely be deciphered, and large numbers have all marks worn off, while some are partly destroyed by fire. Many really fine marble and granite monuments are thrown off the bases, and while it is said to be the intention of the city to move the marked graves to a new location the time

for doing so will surely find many of the marks of identification destroyed. I was told by members of the City Planning committee that it is the intention to smooth over the grounds of this place, after moving the marked graves, and convert it into a park. Many of the graves are those of the so called "health seekers" who died far away from home and friends, and whose graves are marked with a board on which is painted the name, and sometimes age, of the person buried there.

"It is far short of the expectation and wishes of the undersigned [Mr. J. F. Reynolds] inasmuch as it has been impossible to trace our family lines back to their landing upon American shores. This great disappointment and

others, it is hoped, will not destroy the value of the work. This data is closed in its imperfect state on account of the age and ill health of the author, and the fear that none others were interested and a crude collection would be preferable to none." The pamphlet, nevertheless, contains a great deal of valuable information.

CONGDON.—Mr. G. E. Congdon of Grafton, Vermont, is publishing the "Congdon Chronicle," a quarterly pamphlet of about twelve pages. The work shows care and exactness. In addition to the direct lines of descent traced from the immigrant ancestor, Benjamin Congdon of Rhode Island, the author gives the origin of the name, extracts from court and town records thus proving location, and extracts from state vital records of those of the name who do not appear in the direct line of descent. The book is of more than ordinary value, because the exact source of all information is given.

GEER.—"The Geer Genealogy," published in 1923 by Walter Geer, is a revised and enlarged edition. It gives the origin of the name and family, the coat of arms and the direct lines of descent from George and Thomas Geer of Connecticut. It also contains a chapter on "unplaced Geers," and has a very complete index.

WILLIAMSBURG COUNTY, S. C.—"The History of Williamsburg County, South Carolina," by Mr. William Will's Boddie of Kingstree, S. C., contains a history of the people of that county from the first settlement by Europeans about 1705 until 1923. The book is illustrated and contains several maps, the Williamsburg census of 1790, and data copied from old wills. It also has a good index.

SMITH.—"Family Tree Book," genealogical and biographical, listing the relatives of General William Alexander Smith and of W. Thomas Smith. Compiled by them. The book is illustrated and the coats of arms of the Smith and allied families are given in colors. Data are also given from the Flake Tables gathered by Mrs. Julia Flake Burns and by Osmer D. Flake. The books are for sale by Mrs. Betty Smith Hughes, 102 Gramercy Place, Los Angeles, California.

PUTNAM.—The report of the meeting of the Putnam Association of America held at Danvers, Massachusetts, Sept. 14, 1923, is an illustrated pamphlet of forty-five pages containing an address on the public life of Israel Putnam given by Major George Haven Putnam. At this time a tablet which had been placed on the birthplace of Israel Putnam was unveiled. The pamphlet also contains copies of the inscriptions found on other tablets which have been erected to the memory of Israel Putnam.

McNAIR, McNEAR and McNEIR.—"The McNair, McNear and McNeir Genealogies" was compiled by Mr. James Britley McNair, whose address is Box 58, Faculty Exchange, University of Chicago, Chicago, Illinois. The book gives the early origin of the family and follows the different lines of descent through England, Scotland and Ireland, into Canada and the United States. The book contains a good index.

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The Nebraska and Midwest Genealogical Record is a magazine of History and Genealogy. Manuscripts, data and queries upon these subjects are solicited and will be given careful consideration.

THE VAN ARSDALE FAMILY

The reference to the coat-of-arms of the ancient family is that which Ricker states appeared in a bookplate of 1703. In the usual Holland work containing coats-of-arms it does not appear. However, it is stated that, some years ago, the wife of ex-Governor Bedle brought from Holland a copy, and a reproduction of it has been made by a Plainsfield artist for the Van Arsdale family.

The first and fourth quarters consist of arrow heads upon a silver ground; the other quarters are plain red. The crest is a helmet, surmounted by what may be feathers, but has more the appearance of a tree. There is much ornamentation in silver and gold, as was the custom in early Dutch and German armorials.—Somerset County Historical Quarterly, Somerville, New Jersey, April, 1919.

James Ricker, jr., author of "Annals of Newtown," was perhaps the most accurate of the historians who have written concerning the early history and early families of New Netherlands. He was also well qualified to write the early

history of the family in America, as his mother was Elizabeth Van Arsdale, daughter of John Van Arsdale, she being of the sixth generation of the family in America.

The following is quoted from page 307 of the "Annals of Newtown." "The Van Arsdale family derive their origin from Jan Van Arsdale, a Knight of Holland, who, in 1211, erected the castle (now county house) Arsdale and from it took his name. His armorial bearings now constitute the public arms of the bailiwick of Arsdale. From him descended Symon Jansen Van Arsdalen who emigrated to New Amsterdam in 1653 and located at Flatlands, where he served as a civil magistrate and an elder of the Dutch church; and our records prove him to have been a person of no mean education and influence. He died about 1710, leaving sons Cornelius and John, from whom the entire Van Arsdale family in this country have sprung."

James Ricker, jr.'s grandfather, John Van Arsdale, was very prominent as a soldier in the Revolution and on Evacuation Day, November 15, 1783, when the British evacuated New York and the American troops re-entered the city, he climbed the greased flagpole and tore down the British colors and rove a new halyard through the pulley so that the American flag could be unfurled over the city. The British had cut the halyard and nailed the Union Jack securely to the top of the pole and then greased the pole a considerable distance from the ground before leaving Bowling Green where the pole stood.

When the centennial celebration of Evacuation Day was held in New York in 1883 James Ricker, jr. published a pamphlet entitled "Evacuation Day, 1883." On page 24 of this pamphlet Ricker gives a reproduction of the Van Arsdale coat-of-arms. A. Van Doren Honeyman of Plainfield, N. J., in his article, "The Van Arsdale Family-Pluckemin Line," in the April, 1919, number of the Somerset Historical Quarterly, says that it is stated that certain New Jersey members of the family have had a reproduction made by a Plainsfield artist from a copy brought from Holland.

The following is quoted from Ricker's "Evacuation Day," page 24: "Simon Jansen Van Arsdalen, the grandfather of Stoffel (Christopher), was the common ancestor of all in this country bearing the name Van Arsdale or its modification, Van Osdoll, which latter preserves the Dutch pronunciation. He was born in Holland in 1629, of an ancient Helvetian family, emigrated to this country in 1653 and settled at Flatlands, L. I., where he married Peternelle, daughter of Claes (or Nisholas) Wyckoff, etc., etc." Ricker further states that Simon Jansen Van Arsdalen lived to be over four score years of age.

It is impossible to verify the date of birth and death of Simon Jansen as given by Ricker but he is found on the assessment roll of the section of Long Island known as Amsfortt (later Flatlands) for the years 1675, 1676 and 1683 as per the documentary history of New York. He also was included in the census of Flatlands taken in 1698. When the British required all the Dutch inhabitants to take the oath of allegiance at Flatlands September 26-30, 1687, we find "Simon Janse Van Aerts Daalen, 34 years in the country" (Documentary History of New York). His son Cornelius Simonsen Van Arsdale is registered as a native, John Simonsen, his other son, being too young at that time to be required to take the oath. The number of years in the country as given at the time Simon Jansen Van Arsdale took the oath of allegiance when deducted from 1687 proves Ricker's statement that he emigrated in 1653. The fact that he was magistrate in Flatlands as early as 1661 goes a long way in proving Ricker's statement that he was born as early as 1629, for the office was an important one. He held the same office again in 1686. He was a member of the Flatlands church in 1677 and Ricker states that he was repeatedly chosen as elder in that church.

First and principally I commit my soul to God my Creator, hoping thro' the merits of Jesus Christ the Redeemer of Souls to obtain a pardon of all my sins and to inherit everlasting life; and my body I commit to the Earth to be decently buried; and as to the worldly estate and goods with which God has blessed me I dispose of in manner and form following, viz:

Imprimus. It is my will and desire that all my legal debts and funeral charges be paid out of the same, and that the residue and remainder be distributed in manner and form following, viz:

First I give and bequeath to my kind and loving wife, Letty; one new Beuro together with one bed and bedding and the appurtenances to the same likewise all her wearing apparel and a necessary support out of my devised estate.

Secondly, I give and bequeath to my Son Garret forty Dollars current money of the State of New York over and above either of my heirs.

Thirdly. As to the residue and remainder of my Real and personal estate, it is my wish and desire that it be equally divided between my heirs share and share alike.

Fourthly. My real estate I leave to the discretion of my Executor either to sell or reserve the same as they may consider the most advantageous to my aforesaid heirs and legatees.

Lastly, I constitute and appoint my beloved sons, Garret Van Arsdol and Peter Van Arsdol Executors to this my last

Will and Testament hereby revoking all former wills by me heretofore made; and publish this only to be my last will and testament.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this thirteenth day of September in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and seventeen.

Jacob and his son Garrett, whose name is capitalized above, were both contributors to the building of the Owasco Outlet church in 1807. When the pews were auctioned in this church (Owasco Outlet, now Sand Beach) Jacob Van Arsdalen paid \$68 for pew no. 28, the date of the sale being Nov. 17, 1810. On Nov. 24, 1810, Garrett, son of Jacob, bought gallery pew no. 6 for \$25.

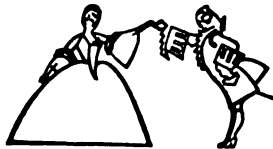

CHRISTIAN¹ MILLER, born Nov. 30, 1670, and his wife Anna Margaret Miller, born Nov. 30, 1680, came to America on the ship "Joyce", and arrived at Philadelphia, Pa. Nov. 30, 1730. Christian Miller participated with the early settlers of his period in many of the contests and treaties with Indians. Their children, all born in the "Fatherland", were:

ANDREW² MILLER (*Christian*¹) was born in Germany in 1717, and came to America with his parents in 1730. He married Nov. 5, 1738, Margaretha Funk. By patents from the Penns, Andrew Miller received 320 acres of land in Lancaster county, Pa. His name appears on the tax lists of Lebanon township in 1750. During the French and Indian War Andrew Miller was a Lieutenant in Capt. Dill's company, Col. Benjamin Chamber's regiment of Lancaster county, 1747-8. He died about June 1, 1754. Miller, sr., became possessed of the bulk of his father's real estate and on a portion of it, in the year 1762, laid out and established the town of Annville, known as Millerstown for a century or more. It is now quite a little city, with a college and flourishing industries within its environments. He was married by the Rev. John Waldsmidt, pastor of Cocalico, Maiden Creek, Selternreich and Wesiachenland churches, to Rebecca, daughter of Philip Epprecht. He removed to Cumberland county and purchased a tract of land in Allen township on the Yellow Breeches Creek called "Round Hill" from the fact that on this tract is a very perfect sugar loaf shaped hill. He died in 1805, and lies buried on the apex of this hill. He purchased this tract May 1, 1777, and is assessed first in Allen township in 1778. He was a Revolutionary soldier. Joseph, Jacob and Andrew Miller, sons of Abraham and Rebecca (Epprecht) Miller, removed from Cumberland county, Pa., to Carroll county, Ohio, about 1820-5. Children of Abraham and Rebecca (Epprecht) Miller were:

He was one of the first deacons of the Dorchester church; with Deacon Samuel Rockwell signed the first Dorchester land grants, 1633. At the time of his settlement there was not a particle of clearing on the lots he had selected. After clearing a place large enough, he erected a rude log cabin, and in this manner lived through the early history of Stow Township, becoming more or less identified with its rise and progress. At the time of his death in June, 1868, his property was divided between his three sons, Jonathan, William and Thomas. The latter, being the youngest, received the home place. THE UPPER MISSOURI HISTORICAL EXPEDITION

A distinguished group of historians and writers from the United States and Canada were invited by Mr. Ralph Budd, the president of the Great Northern railroad, to make a pilgrimage into the Northwest in July of this year. One of the principal objects of the expedition was to do honor to certain early explorers who rendered valuable services in opening the Northwest to civilization. The tour was called the Upper Missouri Historical Expedition and is the most important enterprise of its character ever attempted. This railroad company has set out to build substantial monuments at the important points along its line. A monument to David Thompson, astronomer and geographer, was unveiled at Verendrye, North Dakota, where he took important observation in 1784. A congress of Indians was held at the site of old Fort Union, N. D., at which were representatives of eight Indian tribes. Sunday, July 19th, a trip was made to the battlefields, near Havre, Montana, where Chief Joseph made his last stand. A shaft was erected at Meriwether in honor of Meriwether Lewis at a point near the head of the Marias river. The most important event was the unveiling of a statue to John F. Stevens, discoverer of Marias Pass, at the summit of the Rocky Mountains. Mr. Stevens, whose engineering achievements in the Northwest give him an honored place among the makers of history in that region, was present at the unveiling. At each unveiling the deed to the land upon which the monument was placed was given by the railroad to the state.

The climax of the expedition was the exploration of Glacier Park which is quite beyond description in its beauty and grandeur. At a meeting held at Two Medicine Chalet, in the park, a permanent organization was formed with General Hugh Scot, president, Ralph Budd, honorary president, Pierce Butler and Lawrence Abbott, vice presidents, Agnes Laut, secretary. Mr. Budd announced a program of annual expeditions covering several years. Nebraska was represented by Mrs. Clarence S. Paine, secretary of the Mississippi Valley Historical Association and librarian of the Nebraska State Historical Society.

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The Nebraska Genealogical Society met in regular quarterly session October 23, 1925. There was a short business meeting. Mrs. William Rogers presided. Mrs. D. O. Cleghorn of Chadron, Nebr., who has been a sustaining member since our organization, was in attendance to complete arrangements for publishing the Mayflower lines she has compiled, the first installment of which is in this issue. The program provided by Mrs. J. L. Craig and Mrs. W. S. Whitten was both interesting and instructive.

NOTES, ADDITIONS AND CORRECTIONS TO THE SILVER GENEALOGY

(The genealogy of the Silver Family appeared in the Nebraska and Midwest Genealogical Record for January, 1925.)

Since we find Thomas¹ Silver settled first at Ipswich, Mass., it seems probable that he came over with the great expedition of 1630. Part of this expedition sailed from Southampton, England, which is only a few miles away from Ropley, where in 1630, according to Berry, the descendants of Sir Bartholomew Silver were settled. Hence, a connection between Thomas¹ Silver, the founder of the American family, and the Ropley family seems likely. The arms borne by the Ropley Silvers were: Per pale, gules and sable; a griffin segreant, or. Crest: an heraldic tiger's head, erased, gules; tusked, tufted and maned, or. Burke gives the arms of a Silver family settled at Winchester, England. Winchester is only a few miles from Ropley, and about twelve miles from Southampton. Possibly the Winchester Silvers were also de-

scended from Sir Bartholomew Silver, or at any rate from the same family. Possibly Thomas' Silver, the American settler, was of this line. Silver of Winchester bore as arms: Gules, a fesse potent, a counter-potent, between three lions pass. guard. or.

A Silver family settled at Norwich bore arms so similar to those of Silver of Winchester that there can be no doubt of the connection. Silver of Norwich bore: Gules, a fesse vair, between three lions passant regardant, or. Crest: a demi-lion regardant, or, holding three ears of corn proper, issuant out of a castle, gules. MacKenzie, in his *Colonial Families of the United States*, gives the arms of Silver of Norwich, although with what authority I do not know, as the arms of a Silver family descended from a James Silver or Silvers who settled in Pennsylvania and whose descendants spread into Maryland and Virginia.

Burke also gives the following as a Silver coat-of-arms: A chev. vair, between three mullets. Crest, a lion ramp. holding between the paws a battle-axe.

The Royal Book of Crests gives: A unicorn's head, erased, argent; charged with a chevron, gules, as the crest of a Silver family settled at Netherley, Scotland. Their motto was *Nil Desperandum* (Never Despairing). The same work also gives as a Silver crest: A hand holding a vine branch. Probably some of these crests belong to the coats-of-arms previously mentioned.

There seem to be also Irish Silvers. One writer gives Silver as a modernized form of O'Sullivan.

Savage, in his *New England Families*, gives Thomas Silver, Ipswich, 1637, moved to Newbury and died there in 1682. By first wife had Mary, and by second wife, Catharine ———, whom he married in 1649, had Elizabeth, Martha, Hannah, Sarah, Thomas, born 1652, Thomas again, born 1658, John and Samuel. Savage further says that Thomas Silver of Newbury, who married Mary Williams, was born in 1652 and that he was not a son of Thomas of Ipswich and Newbury who died in 1682.

It will be noted that in my Silver record I consider the Thomas who married Mary Williams as son of Thomas of Ipswich and Newbury, who died in 1682. The records speak of Thomas who married Mary Williams as Junior and I hardly think it likely that there were two Thomas Silvers in Newbury both of whom had sons named Thomas Silver in 1652, as there would have to be if we follow Savage. The records simply don't give any evidence to warrant such a conclusion. The writer believes, therefore, that he is justified in considering Thomas who married Mary Williams as the son of Thomas, who died in 1682.

LANGDON—LANGDELL

My first information as to my great-grandmother was simply that her name was Jane Langdon, and that her father was an English sea captain and was lost at sea. The only reference to her in town histories was in Antrim, N. H., History, which says "Capt. Parker Morse married in 1799 Jane Langdon of Beverly, Mass. They removed to Metamora, Ill., in 1835, where she died Dec. 10, 1853, aged 74 years 2 months." Long search failed to discover a Capt. Langdon or any other Langdon in Beverly, Mass. Two Capt. William Langdons were found in New Hampshire, but they were men of long New England ancestry and both died on land. Neither had a daughter Jane. Of her children, as the family had the list, we knew one was Jane Langdon and one was given as William L. S., and that made me think her father's name was William. She had a grandson on whom she begged to bestow the name of Langdon Livermore. This suggested a Livermore connection. In Beverly records was found William Langdell, whose father, bearing the same name, was born in England and had followed the sea for many years. William, Jr., had a daughter Jane, born Nov. 5, 1776, which did not quite correspond with the gravestone record.

What first attracted attention to this family was the pre-

sence of a Livermore Langdell in it. William Langdell, Sr., married Maria, daughter of Livermore and Sarah (Gage) Whitridge, and had a son Livermore. The History of Woodford County, Ill., says, speaking of Mrs. Jane Morse: "She was the daughter of a sea captain who was lost at sea about the time his little daughter was born. His widow married again a man named Starrett and removed to Francestown, N. H." The Francestown record says: "David Starrett married second Elizabeth [Thorndike] Langdell, widow of William Langdell, Jr., on Feb. 8, 1787." The New Boston, N. H., History, speaking of William Langdell, Sr., says: "He had two sons lost at sea in one vessel." Massachusetts Soldiers & Sailors says that William Langdell was commissioned commander of a privateer brig, Jan. 9, 1779.

About this time I decided that Jane, born Nov. 5, 1776, had died and a younger daughter given the same name. Then I found in Beverly Vital Records: "Jeney, daughter of William Langdell, Jr., baptized Oct. 10, 1779." A search of old family papers at this time disclosed this item in Capt. Morse's own handwriting: "My wife was born Oct. 6, 1779." Also "On June 12, 1799, was solemnity of marriage performed between Parker Morse and Jeney Langdon." In his list of children were: (1) Elizabeth Thorndike, (7) William Langdon Starrett and (8) Joseph Thorndike. Thus we came to feel sure that her name was really Langdell, although it is impossible now to discover why she chose to call it Langdon. In the private records of the Langdell family there was a record of the death of three sons, and two were not known to them. Thomas and William Langdell were these two. Thomas's last child was born Oct. 2 and baptized Oct. 10, 1779, the same day as Jeney, William's daughter. Thomas's widow married Edward Boden and was again a widow in 1790. The item in the Woodford County History, combined with the New Boston record, seems to make certain that William and Thomas Langdell were lost at sea about October, 1779. The other three brothers died on land. The Langdells feel as sure as we do that this conclusion is correct. William and Elizabeth [Thorndike] Langdell had:

This has been a very interesting search and but for Miss Hazel E. Ohman of the St. Paul Historical Library I never could have found it.

THE HAMER FAMILY

WILLIAM¹ HAMER, born in Maryland about 1750 of English stock, started west in the spring of 1792 with his wife and ten children. They came down the Ohio river on a raft and landed at Fort Washington (now Cincinnati). In the spring of 1794 William Hamer procured a pair of horses and rigged up a wagon and, putting thereon his household goods, which were light in those days, started with his family through the wilderness to Dayton, Ohio. Randall and Ryan's History of Ohio states that "the first industrial establishment in Dayton, Ohio, is said to be the 'tub mill' of William Hamer for grinding corn." William Hamer was an itinerant Methodist minister, who later settled on his farm northeast of Dayton, where he died at the advanced age of 82 years. He married Esther Gregg, who was reared by her father's brother, Francis Gregg, her father having been killed by the Indians when Esther was quite young. Their children were:

Line of Descent from William White of the Mayflower

WILLIAM² WHITE was the son of Bishop John¹ White. He married in Leyden, Holland, Susanna Fuller, July 1, 1612, by Rev. John Robinson. William White was the eleventh signer of the Mayflower Compact. Susanna was a sister of Samuel Fuller, who also came on the famous ship. Resolved² White, elder son of this couple, came with his parents, and Peregrine,² the younger son, has the distinction of being the first child of Pilgrim parents to be born in America. William¹ White died early in 1621. Susanna, his widow, married for her second husband Edward Winslow, the third signer of the compact made on the Mayflower and who was the third governor of the colony. After their marriage they lived in Marshfield, their estate being known as "Careswell".

RESOLVED³ WHITE (*William*²) was born in Leyden, Holland, in 1614 and came with his parents to the new world on the Mayflower. He grew to manhood at "Careswell", the estate of his stepfather in Marshfield, and was married there on April 6, 1640, to Judith Vassail of Scituate, Mass., daughter of William Vassail. She died in October, 1670, and on Aug. 5, 1674, he married the widow Abigail Lord. Resolved² White died about 1680, the last survivor, but one, of the Mayflower Company.

SAMUEL⁴ WHITE (*Resolved*,³ *William*²) was born Mar. 13, 1646. He married Rebecca Green and moved to Rochester, Mass.

WILLIAM⁵ WHITE (*Samuel*,⁴ *Resolved*,³ *William*²) was born June 16, 1690, at Rochester. He married Elizabeth Cadman, only child of George and Hannah [Hathaway] Cadman, and settled at Dartmouth, which adjoins Rochester. His will was

made Oct. 3, 1780, but we do not know the date of his death. He had eleven children, mentioned in the will of his mother-in-law, Hannah [Hathaway] Cadman. Of these Abner⁶ White, whose name appears in the title of this compilation, was the eighth. This will was made Feb. 12, 1749, and was proved May 2, 1749. Dartmouth was in Bristol county, Mass., formerly in Rhode Island.

Line of Descent from Richard Warren of the Mayflower

RICHARD¹ WARREN of Greenwich, England, was married before 1611 to the widow Elizabeth Marsh, who was born about 1583 and who died at Plymouth Oct. 2, 1673. He came on the Mayflower, but his wife and their five daughters came on the third ship afterward. He died at Plymouth in 1628. Their daughters were: Elizabeth, Mary, Ann, Abigail and Sarah. (Reference—Mayflower Descendant, vol. 1:152-256; vol. 3:358-450.)

SARAH² WARREN (*Richard*¹) was married Mar. 20, 1634, to John² Cooke, who came with his father, Francis¹ Cooke, on the Mayflower. She was living July 25, 1696.

Line of Descent from Francis Cooke of the Mayflower

FRANCIS¹ COOKE was born in 1577. He was married in 1603 to Hester Mahieu—Hester, "the Walloon," a name given the people from the southern province of Belgium. They were married in Leyden, Holland. His son John² accompanied him on the Mayflower, but Hester, the wife, and the other children came in the Anne in 1623. There was a daughter Jane² and a son Jacob.² Hester died after June 18, 1666, and before Dec. 18, 1675, according to the Mayflower Magazine, 1910. He died at Plymouth April 17, 1663.

JOHN² COOKE (*Francis*¹) married Apr. 7, 1634, at Plymouth, Sarah² Warren. He became prominent in the colony, being ten times deputy from Plymouth, and held the office of deacon many years. He died at Dartmouth, Mass., Dec. 3, 1695.

SARAH³ COOKE, daughter of Sarah Warren and John² Cooke, was married Nov. 20, 1652, to Arthur Hathaway, Jr., who was born in 1631 and died in 1712. He was the son of Arthur Hathaway, Sr., an early settler of Marshfield, Mass.,

the name of whose wife is unknown. Arthur Hathaway, Jr., was juror, selectman and magistrate (1671) in Dartmouth. (Authority for all the foregoing: New England Historic Genealogical Register, vol. 55: 70-74, and Austin's R. I. Records.)

HANNAH⁴ HATHAWAY, daughter of Sarah³ Cooke and Arthur Hathaway, married George Cadman, son of William and Elizabeth Cadman. William died in 1684 at Portsmouth, R. I., and his wife died there in 1688. From Austin's Genealogical Dictionary of Rhode Island we find George Cadman prominent in his locality, being mentioned as a jurymen, surveyor, selectman, treasurer and overseer of poor, and Nov. 24, 1718, he made his will, which was proved Jan. 6, 1719. He made his wife, Hannah, executrix of his will and left all to her until their grandson, George, came of age. To his daughter, Elizabeth [Cadman] White, and her husband, William⁴ White, he left the land where they lived, for life. He named the five grandchildren he then had: William, George, Roger, Christopher and Sarah. Hannah [Hathaway] Cadman, however, lived thirty years after her husband died, and in the will she made Feb. 12, 1749, which was proved May 2, 1749, she named eleven grandchildren, indicating that, in the thirty years after the death of George Cadman, six more children were born to their daughter Elizabeth and her husband William⁴ White. These six were named: Elizabeth, Oliver, Abner, Thomas, Hannah and Susannah.

ELIZABETH⁵ CADMAN, daughter, and only child of Hannah⁴ Hathaway and George Cadman, married William⁴ White of Dartmouth. Some data of their 11 children follow:

The foregoing data are accepted by the Mayflower Society, of which the compiler is a member, having the general number 7917 and number 73 in the state of Kansas, as a descendant of Francis Cooke and Richard Warren. She also belongs to the Daughters of Patriots and Founders of America, on the line of William White and his son Resolved of the Mayflower. She is the first to make proof through Abner White, whose name is given an honor place in the title of this compilation.

ABNER^s WHITE, eighth child of William^s and Elizabeth [Cadman] White, was born about 1725 at Dartmouth, Bristol county, Mass, formerly in Rhode Island. He married Apr. 14, 1745-6, at Little Compton, R. I., to Ruth Brownell, daughter of Charles and Mary [Wilber] Brownell. (More concerning the Brownell family will be found elsewhere.) The intention of their marriage was filed Feb. 22, 1745 (See Rhode Island Vital Records, vol. 4, Little Compton, pp. 11 and 87. Also Kirbys of New England). They were married by Richard Billings, J. P. They moved to Dutchess county, N. Y., before 1752, the first mention of them being there at that time. They were farmers, and lived near the four corners of Mabbettsville. They died there and are buried in the family burying ground on the farm. The writer visited this spot in May, 1924, and at that time many of the inscriptions were easily deciphered. Many stones were fallen and broken. The one of Ruth White looks as though it might last forever. The record, crudely chiseled in black slate-like stone, poorly spelled, probably erected in loving memory by the surviving children, follows:

“R Whit dyed march 28 1806 aged 78 years and 8 months and 22 days”.

A head stone and a foot stone beside her grave very evidently mark her husband's grave but the carving, were there ever any, is not to be seen.

This "White Burying-ground" is in the woods on a slight elevation, on the farm once owned by Abner White. It lies in a northeasterly direction from the "four-corners" of Mabbettville (first called Filkentown). Going eastward from the four-corners about a quarter of a mile on the turnpike, it lies about a quarter of a mile north and back from the turnpike. It is in sight of the house built by Morris White, grandson of Abner and Ruth, and presumably on the site of the original homestead. Miss Maggie Murphy, who owned the place in 1924, said that her family bought it from Andrew J. White, the son of Morris White, and that her family had lived there 47 years. The house is well preserved and is rather prepossessing in architecture. The stair and newel post of black walnut are especially beautiful.

In the will of Abner White, made in Dutchess county, N. Y., June 30, 1794, Charles is given the homestead and some woodlands; to William is given 356 pounds; to Thomas 356 pounds; to James 100 pounds, saying he has had some previously. He also mentions his daughters Mary Harris and Ruth Merritt, and grandsons Thomas and Jeremiah Doty, sons of "my daughter Ruth". The executors of his will were his sons Charles and William, and Silas Deuel, Jr. Children:

CHARLES⁷ WHITE, son of Abner,⁶ born Dec. 2, 1753, at Mabbettsville, Dutchess county, N. Y., married about 1775-76 Elizabeth Doty, daughter of William Doty of Dover, Dutchess county, N. Y., whose descendants claim as their ancestor Edward Doty, Mayflower passenger and signer of the Compact. His will was made Aug. 8, 1818, at Washington, Dutchess county, N. Y. He died at Mabbettsville April 17, 1822, and is buried in the family plot on the farm. Below is the warning on his tombstone:

ville, N. Y., in 1756, married Eunice White, daughter of William and Ruth White, of "the Salisbury Whites". They had moved to Dutchess county, N. Y., from Salisbury, Conn., about 1720. Numerous deeds, documents, wills and other interesting records of this family are in the possession of Mrs. C. O. Miller, 60 Urban street, Stamford, Conn. They were Quakers and went to the "old brick meeting". William White joined them also. Eunice was born June 29, 1762, and died Feb. 29, 1816. The "Salisbury Whites" lived at Washington Hollow. William⁷ White served in the Revolution from Dutchess county, N. Y., in the 7th regiment of militia, under Maj. Adams (See Land Bounty Rights, Dutchess county, N. Y.). Descendants of this man are eligible to the Daughters of the American Revolution, the service being accepted for the compiler of these data. William⁷ White died Aug. 24, 1802, the day after he made his will, which is on record in the court house in Poughkeepsie, N. Y. THE NEBRASKA GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY

The Nebraska Genealogical Society was organized to further genealogical investigation. The object of the society is to collect genealogical material and to make it available to all who desire to pursue the search for family history. These records are not for today but for tomorrow and for the tomorrows of the future when these records, if not preserved, will be lost to our succeeding generations. Edmund Burke says, "Those only deserve to be remembered who treasure up the history of their ancestry," and Lord Macaulay says, "They who take no pride in worthy achievements of remote ancestors will never achieve anything worthy to be remembered with pride by remote descendants."

Membership in the Nebraska Genealogical Society is open to those who are interested in genealogical research. The dues of the society are two dollars a year. This includes a subscription to The Record and two genealogical charts, one of which is to be filled out and returned to the society for permanent record. For those who are especially interested in the work a sustaining membership has been established at a cost of five dollars a year and a life membership at fifty dollars.

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MRS. EDGAR H. ALLEN

MRS. EDGAR H. ALLEN, who was vice-president of the Nebraska Genealogical Society last year, died at the Paxton Memorial hospital in Omaha, January 24, 1926.

Mrs. Allen will be missed in many walks of life on account of her varied activities. She was a past regent of Omaha Chapter, D. A. R., a past president and a charter member of the Omaha Woman's Club, a member of the Colonial Dames, Daughters of Founders and Patriots, and the Society for New England Women. She was interested in the Y. W. C. A., the Child Saving Institute, Camp Brewster and other philanthropic institutions.

While regent of the Omaha Chapter, D. A. R., she took personal charge of the chapter's work for Red Cross, with the result that a large amount of army and Red Cross supplies as well as money was donated. She was the "mother" to a war orphan whom she supported.

Mrs. Allen was noted for her private charities, the extent of which will never be known, for she worked so quietly and so unostentatiously. She gave assistance to many women and girls when help was most needed.

The Amanda Barker Devin Chapter, D. A. R., was founded by Mrs. Allen in honor of her mother, at McConnellsville, Ohio. She was interested in building up a genealogical library for its use. She also copied and compiled the genealogy of the four-hundred and forty-four women of the Omaha

Chapter which entitled them to membership in the D. A. R., and presented it to the library of the National Society in Memorial Continental Hall, Washington, D. C.

Mrs. Allen was a great reader and regarded as a historian of ability. She had personally provided markers for several historic spots in Nebraska and was planning to provide some place in which to preserve historical relics of the state.

In addition to all this, she had many business interests that demanded her attention, her husband having died several years ago.

Mrs. Allen was a descendant of Thomas Baker, through whose services she proved her eligibility to the Colonial Dames. The line of descent is as follows:

She presented each of her sixteen grandchildren with a set of solid silver spoons; they are engraved "MW" and are highly prized by those who have them. She was a very active woman, and very small. She was named "Little Grandmother" by Lillian White Osborn (Noble), to distinguish her from her other grandmother, who was a large woman. While in Iowa she made a trip to Fairfax, Missouri, in a spring wagon. It was across open prairies—no roads, fences or bridges. When asked if she thought she could stand the trip, for she was then 85 years old, she laughed and said "Yes, I could ride it on a barrel head in a lumber wagon." Her daughter Ellen came to Farragut, Iowa, to make her home with her brother Egbert after the death of "Little Grandmother" in 1883. With her she brought many

of the family keepsakes and valuables, many of which were lost when the Egbert White home burned. A few had been given to other members of the family, so escaped. The old family Bible is in the possession of Isaac White, Buenna, Washington. In it are chronicled the family records from William White, born in 1756, down to the present generation. A beautiful blue and white counterpane had been given to her nephew, Frank White. It is still in the possession of that family at Clarinda, Iowa, and in perfect condition. The following is woven in the corners: "Agriculture and Manufactures are the foundation of our independence. July 4, 1824. A. Kline." The center is the popular snowball pattern and the border is a series of figures and emblems commonly used in Masonic lodges.

THE MOULTON FAMILY

The Moulton family were known to fame in France in the eleventh century, when King William, the Norman, embarked for England. Sir Thomas de Moulton accompanied him and fought at the battle of Hastings, A. D. 1066. He was rewarded for his services with great tracts of land in Lincolnshire, and on that memorable field he built castles and religious establishments, maintaining a retinue of soldiers, laborers and priests. He lived in the proud style of the Norman nobleman of his time. He was called Lord de Vaux by the Normans and Lord of Gillesland by the Saxons. About 1100 the town of Moulton was founded in England.

A Sir Thomas de Moulton was the leading character in *The Talisman*, by Sir Walter Scott. A great friend of King Richard, Coeur de Lion, he commanded the admiration and envy of the knights at the great tournaments of England, and during Richard's sickness was ruler de facto. In the Holy Land he was a leading crusader.

At the age of thirteen, Margaret Moulton fell heir to the Moulton estates. King Edward II entrusted her to Beau-

champ, Earl of Warwick. She lived at Warwick Castle until her marriage to Ralph Dacre. They and their descendants held the vast possessions for the next two-hundred and fifty years. Elizabeth married Lord William Howard. Naworth Castle passed to the Howard family and now belongs to the Earl of Carlisle, a Howard in blood and name. The Moultons, Dacres and Howards are inheritors of the best blood of England. Noble castles and chapels in Lincoln, Cumberland and Norfolk counties still stand as monuments to the worthy knights who founded them. Greystock fell to the Earl of Arundel. It is now in possession of the Duke of Norfolk. In the banquet hall, at the extreme end of Naworth Castle, are two griffins bearing banners with engraved arms of the Moulton and Dacres families.

JOHN¹ MOULTON of Ormsby, Norfolk county, England, was the emigrant ancestor. He was born 1599, died 1650, married Anne, who died April 12, 1668. He came to America in 1637 and was given the grant of Hampton. In 164— he was chosen its first deputy or representative to the General Court in Boston. John Moulton and Anna had a son John.

THE CHILDREN OF SAMUEL SMITH OF TOPSFIELD, MASSACHUSETTS

A writer whose article on "Robert Smith of Boxford" appears in *The New England Historic Genealogical Register*, vol. 55, page 267, says, concerning Samuel, son of Robert: "The Topsfield records give a large number of children to Samuel Smith. It is impossible to tell whether they all belong to this Samuel or not, but his will mentions daughters and two sons, Samuel and Robert. I included the full list, as given in the church records in Topsfield."—and proceeds to give the birth dates of twenty children, attributing them to this man.

The same writer states that this Samuel Smith married first Phebe Howe and secondly Rebecca, daughter of John Curtis of Topsfield.

A critical study of Topsfield vital statistics as found in *Topsfield Historical Society Collections*, vol. IX, has led to the conclusion that these children were born to three different couples, viz., Samuell Smith and Phebe Dow, Samuell Smith "of Salem" and Sarah Curtis, and Samuel Smith and Rebecca Curtis. The following tables are submitted, with reasons given for the above deductions.

I. SAMUEL SMITH and Phoebe Dow (not Howe) were married January 16, 1694-5 [Topsfield Historical Coll., vol. IX, p. 138, 187]. Children, references for birth found in same volume, as indicated:

Reasons for grouping these children together as being of the same family are:

- (1) In each instance, the record is a church record, of baptism, instead of birth.
- (2) In each instance, the name of only one parent is given, that of the father, Samuell, being used eight times, that of the mother, Sarah, twice, and that of the grandfather, Corp. Curtis, once.

Notes on pages 134 and 135, same volume, explain the

different ways of spelling the surname Curtis. In her marriage record Sarah's name is spelled "Curtious", while in her birth record (vol. IX, p. 39) it is spelled "Curtice", while that of her brother Samuel and her sister Hephzibah is spelled "Curtious", and that of other brothers and sisters, "Curtis".

(3) In each instance where the father's name is given, it is spelled "Samuell", as it is in the marriage record.

- (2) The father's name in each instance is spelled "Samuel."
- (3) In each instance the name of both parents are given.

Further, it is quite evident that Samuell Smith, husband of Phoebe Dow, and Samuel Smith, husband of Rebecca Curtis, were not one and the same person. for the following reasons:

- (1) The death of Phebe (Dow) Smith is not of record in Topsfield statistics.
- (2) The birth records of the children of Phebe uniformly give the name of the father as "Samuell", while in the records of Rebeckah's children, the father's name appears uniformly as "Samuel".
- (3) In the will of Samuel, husband of Rebecca, he mentions daughters and two sons, Samuel and Robert, which corresponds exactly to the records of births to this couple, while

the record of Phebe records another Samuel, a Solomon and a Joseph.

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THE NEBRASKA GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY

The Nebraska Genealogical Society, believing that it is the duty of the people of the Middle West to connect the present with the past, is endeavoring to interest the individual in collecting and preserving such vital records, antedating 1850, as now remain in existence. Anyone desiring to help in this important work may do so (1) by subscribing to our magazine, (2) by becoming an active, sustaining or life member of the society, (3) by contributing data (inscriptions from gravestones bearing a birth date prior to 1850; abstracts from wills giving the full name of the maker of the will, when the will was made, when and where it was probated, the name of the wife, if given, and the names of the children and other relatives mentioned in the will; Bible records; family lines, etc.) and (4) by helping to enforce the registration law which has been passed in Nebraska providing that all birth, death, marriage and divorce records be filed with the proper authorities.

You may secure the marriage records from the county judge's office, the divorce records from the office of the district clerk, the birth records from your local registrar, who is usually the town or city clerk. The Nebraska registration law went into effect in 1904. Since that time these records have all been filed at our State House. We shall be glad to receive a copy of any records antedating 1904.

There are various motives that incite the individual to study genealogy. Some men and women are actuated by a spirit of altruism. Other inquirers are inclined to trace their family lines on account of tales of vast estates which remain in abeyance in the Old World and a few smaller estates in this country. Some individuals seem to be urged on by curiosity alone. To establish their claim to descent from some noted warrior, some distinguished statesman or the first settlers of our country seems to be the height of

their ambition. A limited class of Americans seem to take real pleasure in collecting kings, dukes and earls, not in a spirit of snobbery but in the same spirit displayed by the collector of rare books and coins. Whatever the incentive, the result is the same. The work will be invaluable to succeeding generations, provided it is done accurately and systematically.

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THE IMPORTANCE OF GENEALOGY

Mrs. A. L. Ozmun of Lead, South Dakota, who is an enthusiast and painstaking genealogist, was asked to write a short article on the importance of genealogy. Her reply may be found in the following paragraphs:

"Now, it's rather at variance with this thought, but I confess I had never thought of it as especially important, although I could see where the study of history in which our forebears figured would tend to appreciation of our country and its ideals.

"At least, with me it has been a sort of frolic, a recreation, a game of absorbing interest, 'like a cross-word puzzle' someone has said. But its by-product, in my experience, has been such a delving into religious history, national history and racial history as nothing else could have provoked. The study of the Puritan exodus has led to a broader and more comprehensive view of our Life and Liberty in Christ, and for the first time, I think, I am realizing something of what means 'heir of the ages'. To know one has, for instance, an infinitesimal strain of the blood of the Wicked King John in one's veins may not tend to vanity but it 'takes the edge off' a little to know that one has five or six of the twenty-five signers of the Magna Charta, men who braved royal wrath and gave us our first Charter of Liberty.

"But perhaps an inkling of importance to the future has come to me in the past few hours in reading 'The Fruit of the Family Tree'.

"What varied ancestral lines will go into this new D. A. R. record! How few of our D. A. R. women can claim undiluted Colonial ancestry. How many, especially the farther west one goes, have in their veins the blood of those newly arrived in the United States. Perhaps a century from now conclusions of vast importance may be possible from the data contributed at this time and for which the motive may at present be but family pride or eager patriotism."

BIRTH RECORDS

Has your birth been registered at the State House in Lincoln? Have the births of your children been registered? Shall we look the matter up for you?

There is hardly a relation of life, social, legal or economic, in which the evidence furnished by accurate registration of births may not prove to be of the greatest value, not only to the individual but also to the public at large. These birth records are frequently used in many practical ways:

(1) As evidence to prove the age and legitimacy of heirs;

- (2) As proof of age to determine the validity of a contract entered into by an alleged minor;
- (3) As evidence to establish age and proof of citizenship and descent in order to vote;
- (4) As evidence to establish the right of admission to the professions and to many public offices;
- (5) As evidence of legal age to marry;
- (6) As evidence to prove the claims of widows and orphans under the widows' and orphans' pension law;
- (7) As evidence to determine the liability of parents for the debts of a minor;
- (8) As evidence in the administration of estates, the settlement of insurance and pensions;
- (9) As evidence to prove the irresponsibility of children under legal age for crime and misdemeanor, and various other matters in the criminal code;
- (10) As evidence in the enforcement of law relating to education and to child labor;
- (11) As evidence to determine the relations of guardians and wards;
- (12) As proof of citizenship in order to obtain a passport;
- (13) As evidence in the claim for exemption from or the right to jury or military service.

An affidavit of any person who has personal knowledge of a birth will be accepted as proof. Have your birth registered before your relatives or friends who could make affidavit have passed away. Do not neglect to have your children's births registered. It may save them much trouble and annoyance at some future time. If you desire a birth certificate, notify us, and the proper blanks will be sent to you.

VICKERY

The name Vickery is spelled Vikarie and Vickarie in the early records, and the first of that name in England, the father of Thomas Vickery, is said to have come from Holland when a young man and settled probably at Alresford, Hants.

The parish records of the births, marriages and deaths of Bentworth, England, show that **Thomas Vickery** of Vikarie was born in 1748, for he died there in 1831 at the age of 83 years. He was married on June 14, 1775, to Olive Hockley in Bentworth. She was born in 1756 and died in Bentworth in 1828 at the age of 72. The children of Thomas and Olive (Hockley) Vickery were:

WILL OF WILLIAM WHITE

This sixth day of ninth month One Thousand Eight hundred and eleven, I William White, of the town of Washington, in Duchess County, and state of New York, considering the shortness and uncertainty of time here and being favoured with sound disposing mind and memory, and believing it to be necessary and right to make a Distribution of my outward estate that I am favoured with, by will in the following manner, viz:

IMPRIMIS: It is my will and I do hereby direct my executors hereafter named, in the first place to collect my money and pay all my just debts and funeral expenses.

ITEM: I give and bequeath to my loving wife Ruth all the money she has at her command, and all my household furniture as long as she remains my widow, then I give the remainder that she leaves, to my two daughters, Hannah and Ruth, and to my eight grandchildren, the children of my daughter Ruth deceased, viz: John, Silas, Ruth, Hannah Eunice, Henry, Alfred and William, viz: two thirds to my two daughters and one third to my above named eight grandchildren, to be equally divided between them.

I further give to my said wife, Ruth, the use of my dwelling house, and the use of one equal third part of my farm that I now live on, and one of my best cows and six sheep, during the time that she remains my widow.

ITEM: I give and bequeath to my son Silas, one hundred Dollars to be paid to him out of the vallue of my farm & Then I give the residue of my farm whereon I live to my five sons Benjamin, William, David, Joshua, and Silas with all the priviledges and appurtenances thereunto belonging, to be equally divided between them, shear and shear alike, to them and their heirs and assigns forever.

ITEM: I further give to my said sons Benjamin William, David, Joshua, and Silas all my horses, cattle, and farming utentials, to be equally divided between them.

ITEM: I give and bequeath to my two grandsons Stephen and Philip Angevine and to my three grand-daughters

Clarry Eunice and Catherine Angevine the sum of Fifty Dollars to be divided equally between them and direct my executors hereafter named to pay the same as they arrive to lawful age.

ITEM: I give and bequeath to my two daughters, Hannah and Eunice and to my eight grandchildren, the children of my daughter Ruth deceased, viz. John, Silas, Ruth, Hannah, Eunice, Henry Alfred and William, all the residue of my estate that is not given away, viz. two thirds to my two daughters and one third to my above named eight grandchildren to be equally divided between them.

My will and meaning is that if either of my above mentioned children should decease before they receive their legacy, and leaving no lawful issue, that his or her share be equally divided between the survivors of them.

It is also my will and meaning that if either of my above named grandchildren should decease before they receive their legacy and leaving no lawful issue that his or her share be equally divided between his or her brothers and sisters.

ITEM: I do here nominate, constitute, and appoint my son Benjamin and my son-in-law Silas Deuel my only and lawful executors to this my last will and testament.

The word "eight" between the eighth and ninth line on this side was interlined before the ensembling of these presents.

Signed, sealed and published, pronounced and declared by said William White to be his last will and testament in the presence of

his mark.

A mistake was evidently made in the wording of the above will, by Isaac Thorne who drew it up, and Eunice's child did not receive anything from their grandfather's estate. William White evidently meant Thorne to say **Eunice** in place of **Ruth**, who died before her father, where he said "to my two daughters Hannah and Ruth, and to my eight grand-

children, the children of my daughter Ruth deceased". Isaac Thorn learned of the mistake, and told Silas Deuel, the husband of William White's daughter Ruth, and he, Silas Deuel, voluntarily paid over to Eunice White's children that part of his wife's portion which he considered would have been theirs had the will been properly drawn.

There is a military record for this William, Sr., and his son William, Jr., brother of Eunice.

SALMON WHEELER BEARDSLEY was born Nov. 5, 1759, in North Fairfield, Connecticut; died May 16, 1825, in Eden, New York. He married, in 1784, Abigail Penfield, who was born 1764, died 1850. Salmon Wheeler Beardsley enlisted in the Revolutionary War from North Fairfield, Connecticut, January 13, 1781, to serve three years. His name is last borne on a roll dated May 26, 1783, without special mark relative to his service. He was taken prisoner on Lake Champlain by General Carleton's fleet, a discharge or parole of honor was given to him by General Waterbury. NATHANIEL BINGHAM, son of Nathaniel Bingham by his first wife, was born in Norwich, Connecticut, between 1723 and 1734, died about 1802 in Chesterfield, New Hampshire, of numb palsy, buried there in cemetery of the Presbyterian Church. He married April 19, 1748, Joanna Read. He removed from Norwich, Connecticut, to Chesterfield, New Hampshire, in 1763. His farm was 250 acres and lay half a mile north of that village on the main road toward Westmoreland and Dartmouth College. He built and managed Bingham's Tavern on or near the Weatherbee Hill. When the Revolutionary War broke out, he with his three sons, Elisha, Theodorus and Gustavus, joined the army. These three sons had settled on farms near their father. After their term of enlistment had expired, he with Theodorus and Gustavus returned home. His eldest son, Elisha, had died in camp of camp fever. Nathaniel Bingham was a selectman of Chesterfield 1770 and 1775. In 1771 he was one of a committee to provide a minister. He and his son Theodorus were signers of what is known as the Association Test. He was also representative in the General Court for Chesterfield and Hinsdale(?), 1779-80. He was in a company of Colonel Ashley's Regiment, which went to Ticonderoga, June 29, 1777. He had ten children who all married. Eight were living in 1802. THE NEBRASKA GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY.

The Nebraska Genealogical Society, realizing that the responsibility of connecting the past with the present rests upon the people of the Middle West, is endeavoring to interest the individual in finding the missing links.

Whenever a member of an eastern family moved westward, the family chain was broken, and many times that particular link was lost, since the chief record was the family Bible.

It is our duty to collect and preserve these records which form the basis of all genealogical work including the production of family histories. Without them all our ancestral lines would end a few generations back in a hopeless tangle.

Originally in this country such records were kept only by inscriptions on gravestones, by entries in family Bibles, by church records and by the filing of records in a few instances with town clerks. Even though these records were scattered, inaccessible and lacking in permanence, they are invaluable to the historian and biographer of today. Without these records it would be impossible to trace our family lines. Is it not our duty to keep a better record for succeeding generations?

In the United States, genealogy was generally neglected until the latter part of the nineteenth century, when the organization of patriotic, State and colonial societies aroused an interest in genealogy. This interest has given birth to most of our town histories whereby material invaluable to succeeding generations is being preserved.

It is important that a correct genealogical record of every family be kept in order to prevent controversies in regard to heirship and fraudulent distributions of property.

One after another our States are passing "registration" laws providing that all records of births, deaths, marriages and divorces occurring throughout the State after the passage of the act be filed at the capital. In addition to this, New Hampshire statutes provide for the collection of the older vital records, antedating the registration act. The New Hampshire law requires the town and city clerks to file transcripts of all the old vital records in their custody running back to the earliest colonial times with the Registrar of Vital Statistics at Concord.

In 1910, Vermont enacted a law similar to that of New Hampshire. In addition to the ordinary records kept by the town clerks, the Vermont statutes covered church records and gravestone inscriptions bearing dates earlier than 1870. The object of the law of 1910 and its amendments was to compel the filing of all missing records from the earliest time to 1870, so as to complete the different family records.

Nebraska has a registration law but does not have a statute providing for the collection and preservation of the old vital records. The Nebraska Genealogical Society is therefore urging that the citizens of our State make an effort to collect gravestone inscriptions bearing a birth date antedating 1850, to copy court records of marriages and divorces previous to 1904 when our registration law went into effect, to visit your court house and make abstracts of wills giving the name of the maker of the will, the date when the will was made, when and where it was probated, the name of the wife, if given, and the names of the children and other relatives mentioned in the will, to copy birth and death records found in the office of your town and county clerks, and to collect old Bible records. Send these data to the Nebraska Genealogical Society, where they will be filed in such a way that they will be accessible to all who desire to use them, and where they will be preserved for succeeding generations. Whenever it is practical, the data

will be published in the Nebraska and Midwest Genealogical Record.

Do not hoard the material which you have acquired, even though it has cost you time and money. Your children may not be as interested in it as you are and after you are gone, unless there is a permanent record of it, it may soon be lost to succeeding generations.

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UNTHANK FAMILY.

The Unthank family was founded in England with the family seat at Intewood Hall, County of Norfolk. The Unthank family long seated at Unthank of the County of Northumberland, England, was founded by Thomas Unthank in 1568.

The family was represented at the close of the seventeenth century by Robert Unthank Esq. of Unthank, Northumberlandshire, England. His will, dated March 27, 1694, requested that he be buried in the chapel of the parish church of Aluham beside his ancestors. By his wife, Jane, he had the following children: Edward, Elizabeth, Thomas and Rebecca.

The family coat of arms was Or, Gu between two crescents in the pale of the crest and as many griffins head arased in Fesse Sa. Motto: Esta Sempre Fidelis. Seal: Intewood Hall, Norwick, England.

Major William Clement Joseph William Unthank of Intewood Hall, County of Norfolk, England, was born August 18, 1847, married 1873. He was captain of the seventeenth lancers and justice of the peace for Norfolk County.

The family history in America tells of William Unthank, who served in the Revolutionary War as a private in Captain John K. Smith's company, in Colonel Calvin Smith's (late Wigglesworth's) regiment, continental army pay account for May 15, 1777 to May 12, 1780. Residence, South Bourough. It also tells of Captain Aaron Unthank, Haynes County, who served in Edward Wigglesworth's regiment, May 15, 1777. He enlisted for three years and was reported sick in the general hospital.

The Unthank family, when they came over from England, settled in North Carolina, then drifted north to Massachusetts and Vermont. Our branch of the family moved to Indiana and settled near Richmond, Winchester and Fort Wayne. My father was born at Newport and attended school there. My grandfather and family emigrated from Indiana to Nebraska and homesteaded in Nebraska near Bell Creek, which is now Arlington. My grandfather, John A. Unthank, was a member of the Nebraska Territorial Legislature. John A. Unthank married Mary Jane Curtis, daughter of Samuel Curtis, who served as captain with Lincoln in the Blackhawk War, and as lieutenant colonel

in the Civil War. My father, Oliver N. Unthank, served as a government operator at Fort Laramie, Wyoming, from 1869 to 1871.

Egbert White (Isaac⁸, William A.⁷), grandfather of the compiler, was born at Beekman, New York. He died December 15, 1901, at Farragut, Iowa, and is buried there. Married September 20, 1846, Mary Ann Wright of Beekman. She was born November 16, 1827, at Warwick, Orange County, New York, later moving to Beekman where she married. She died January 14, 1916, at the home of her daughter, Charlotte Ann Blevins, at 1277 West 23rd Street, Los Angeles, and is buried at Farragut, Iowa.

Mary Ann Wright was the daughter of Phoebe Halstead, born November 26, 1791, and John Wright, born February 25, 1786. John Wright was in the war of 1812, and his father, David Wright, was in the same company of Ulster County militia, with Gershom Halstead, father of Phoebe Halstead. There is an interesting family tradition that the father of David Wright was in sympathy with the king during the Revolution and on one occasion drove beef cattle where the British could get them. The plan was discovered by his son, David, and with the assistance of Gershom Halstead, was frustrated, and had it not been for the undoubted loyalty of these two, the father of David would have fared badly.

Gershom Halstead was born October 25, 1750, in Scotland. He served in the Revolution from New Windsor, Orange County, New York, in the company commanded by Col. James McClaughry of Ulster County militia, 2nd regiment. The service is accepted by the Daughters of the American Revolution for the compiler.

Gershom Halstead married Mary Smith. He died June 7, 1822, and is buried in the "Old Town burying ground" at New Windsor. On his gravestone is the following quaint warning: "Behold and see as you pass by; As you are now,

so once was I; As I am now, so you must be; Prepare for death and follow me."

For three years after their marriage, Egbert White and his wife lived at Beekman. Their oldest child was born there. In 1850 they moved to Wethersfield (now Kewanee) Illinois. VICKERY.

William Henry Vickery³ (William², Thomas¹) was born August 20, 1824, in Hamshire, England, and married Elizabeth Frost on August 22, 1847. She was born August 13, 1823, in Kent, England. They came to America immediately after the marriage and landed at New Orleans after a long sea voyage in a sailing vessel. Cholera broke out upon the ship and many died. They remained in New Orleans four months when they moved to St. Louis. Here the cholera also was raging but, while very ill with it, they escaped death. In 1851 they removed to Jacksonville, Illinois. William Henry Vickery was a baker and confectioner; one of the best in his profession at that time. He was head baker for the State Hospital for the Insane at

Jacksonville for some years. Later he started a bakery and grocery store in partnership with a Mr. Hughes and they carried on the largest and best bakery for several years. Just before the opening of the Civil War he broke up in business and was one of the first to enlist. The first service was for nine months at the end of which time he re-enlisted and served until the close of the war in company G, 14th regiment, Illinois Volunteer Infantry, under General John M. Palmer. He was in many battles, among which were the battles of Pittsburgh Landing and Shiloh. He was honorably discharged at the end of the war and returned to Jacksonville. In 1865, feeling the restlessness that possessed the soldier, he left for Quincy, Illinois, where he joined a party of surveyors for the Union Pacific Railroad Company in charge of provisions. He camped out during the entire survey straight to California. He remained in San Francisco and other places in California a short time then shipped as steward on a steamer to China. He traveled over the Orient in this manner. He returned to California and was on his way home, according to a letter received from him in the spring of 1875, in which he stated that he would be in Jacksonville by August 20. He was never heard from afterwards and probably met with sudden death. He was a well read man and had seen much of the world. Most of his education was obtained in Quincy, Illinois, where his mother taught school.

MAYFLOWER LINE FROM JOHN AND PRISCILLA ALDEN.

John Alden (1599-1687) arrived in Plymouth, Massachusetts, in the ship, Mayflower, in 1620. He was the youngest and last survivor of the Pilgrims who signed the noted Compact. His long and valuable life was distinguished foreminent services rendered to the Colony. He married Priscilla Mollines, who also came in the Mayflower

with her father and mother, William and Alice Mollines. To John and Priscilla were born eight children; the oldest daughter, Elizabeth (Betty Alden) married William Pabodie.

Elizabeth Alden, born at Plymouth, Massachusetts, 1624, married December 26, 1644, William Pabodie, and died at Little Compton, Rhode Island, May 31, 1717.

Rebecca Pabodie, daughter of William and Elizabeth Pabodie, born 1659, married William Southworth, (about) 1680, and died December 3 (or 23), 1702.

BARRINGTON, NEW HAMPSHIRE.

Like many other New England settlements, Barrington, New Hampshire, lost most of its records, both town and church, through Indian raids and by fires. Captain William Cate, who was allied to the New Hampshire Young, Hayes, Cotton, Tucker, Emmons and Fernall families, was one of the earliest settlers. There is a Cate genealogy a thin, amateurish book, whose shortcomings inspired Eben Putnam to marginal comments and his copy is now in a large Boston library. The seeker for truth had to go to the poor farm! The town of Barrington, a hundred years ago, bought the old Cate farm for its own use and the family graveyard was left undisturbed in the town's care. Tracing the land transfers pointed the way to this source.

A History of Jefferson County, Indiana, has been presented to our library. Histories from other counties, especially from those outside of Nebraska will be greatly appreciated.



Sixth.—Transcriptions of Bible records of single families prior to 1850.


